
## Let's do Lunch!

**January 6th** - *Are We Doing this Right?* by Jeff Rodriguez. Almost every parent struggles with how to handle "sex ed." But despite our best intentions, we still are going about it all wrong. Westside UU member Jeff Rodriguez, who taught this delicate subject for 12 years, will try to de-mystify the process for both parents and teens.

**January 13th** - *Because the Bible Tells Me So...* by Dr. Russell Elleven. Many people live their lives according to the Bible...or say they do. As this new year begins, let's examine a bit about what the Bible says we should do in 2008.

**January 20th** - *The Epic of Evolution* by Connie Barlow. The Epic of Evolution is the 14 billion year story of origins, grounded in mainstream science and told in inspiring, sacred ways. It is our shared creation story, born of the collective efforts of scientists of all ethnicities and faiths. In addition to being humanity's only "planet-wide" creation story, it is also the first such story that evolves as the science itself evolves. It is thus "the story of the changing story." Connie will use as the key example one of the dozen evolutionary parables posted on her [www.TheGreatStory](http://www.TheGreatStory.com) website.

"Pluto's Identity Crisis" was written by Connie in 2003, but it had to be revised after the 2006 proclamation that Pluto was to be classified as a "dwarf planet". Connie is the author of four popular science books that bridge evolution and meaning. Connie and her husband, The Reverend Michael Dowd, are members of the UU Church of the Larger Fellowship and have been called "America's evolutionary evangelists."

**January 27th** - *Let the Music Move You* by the TrUUe Believers. How music shapes our lives and expresses our spirituality.

Meadville Lombard Theological School, a UU seminary in Chicago, Illinois, announces two learning and networking opportunities for lay leaders, seminarians, and ministers:

*Winter Institute - February 8th - February 10th: Can We Build the Beloved Community through Political Action?*

Explore the potential and the limitations of democratic processes for creating the beloved community. During two days of lecture and discussion, consider the kinds of political activities effective in building community and how this political work is connected with the institutional life of the church. This workshop will be led by Dr. Melissa Harris-Lacewell, Associate Professor of Politics and African American Studies at Princeton University and author of "Barbershops, Bibles, and BET: Everyday Talk and Black Political Thought." *Civil Rights Bus Tour: March 22nd - 30th*

Join Rev. Dr. Gordon and Judy Gibson as they take you on a tour of significant sites of the Southern Civil Rights Movement, offering a journey of experiential learning where you will encounter the sights, sounds, and especially the people who worked to create change during this revolutionary time in our country's history. The course is offered for credit for seminary students, but non-students are encouraged to audit the course. Enrollment to take the course for credit will be limited

to 15. An additional 15 seats on the tour will be available to the general public. Registration is on a first-come basis and is due no later than January 18, 2008. Please note that this year the course runs across Easter weekend. Participation for the entire eight days is required for those seeking academic credit and strongly encouraged for all others. ## Tribute to Robert Conti

On October 31, 2007, our dear friend and Westside member, Robert (Bob) Conti died. He leaves behind a wonderful legacy that Unitarian Universalism will enjoy for many years to come.

Many in our congregation did not have the pleasure of meeting Bob as he was in failing health the past few years.

Over the years Bob was an active member in three UU Churches in Fort Worth: the First Unitarian Church; First Jefferson; and, more recently, Westside. During his time with each of these churches, he was a generous financial supporter. In each case, he was the largest contributor to the annual pledge drive. Several times, Bob verified that he had the largest pledge; if he did not, he increased it. He gave the land that First Jefferson is built on.

To Westside, he offered challenge grants to assist, first in remodeling the store front on McCart, later in expanding it, and most recently he offered to match up to \$25,000 for the renovation of our present building.

Bob loved to entertain. For many years he maintained a second home in Acapulco. He offered the use of the house as a Service Auction item for many years. He was a perfect host, dining, and entertaining the purchasers of the trip. He took you to wonderful restaurants and on outstanding tours of the city. Lounging around the back yard pool was very relaxing. Over the years this was the most profitable item for the auction.

Bob always kept a low profile, never serving as an officer in any of the churches. Instead he used his influence for the improvement of each of these churches.

Westside continues to enjoy success with our new plan for service projects. Each month, undesignated plate offerings are donated to a worthy recipient organization. During December, our recipient was the Somali-Bantu Empowering Women Program, a collective of refugee Somali-Bantu women who have gathered in the local area and are producing and selling native craft works to support their new lives here.

For the month of January, the board is pleased to announce that the undesignated plate offering is going to the Southwest Unitarian Universalist Women for the International Convocation of Unitarian Universalist Women. It will be used to assist women from other countries to attend the conference which will be in Houston, Texas, February 27 – March 1, 2009. The Southwest UU Women are providing the major leadership for a unique event, a convocation that is gathering in response to a summons. According to Myrtle McMahan, “We are summoned to respond to a hurting world, to gather as women of faith to share and learn ways we can improve women’s lives. We are coming together in recognition of the need for action. A Global Literacy Project for congregations and women’s groups will be available very soon to assist us in preparation for the Convocation.”

For the month of February, the board is also pleased to announce that the undesignated plate offering is going to the Allied Communities of Tarrant (ACT). ACT has recently been instrumental in informing the public about JPS Hospital’s positions on health care for undocumented aliens and influencing posi-

tive changes in their policies. ACT continues its work to improve health care for Tarrant County's residents by publicizing the recent expansion of access at its member churches. They are resuming their work to improve Fort Worth schools, focusing on attendance, graduation rates and more. ACT meetings are held monthly and are announced at [www.alliedcommunities.org](http://www.alliedcommunities.org). More information about the public outreach and services sponsored by ACT will be included in the February edition of the Westside Story.

We received a list of ten boys and ten girls, ranging in age from infants to eleven-year-olds. Angel Sponsors were asked to provide an outfit of clothing and a toy the child had requested.

Audrey Weil and Beverly Archibald made copies of the angels (pattern provided) and put the information about each child's age, clothing sizes and toy wish on each angel. Dianne Nixon made a cardboard tree for us and put Velcro "dots" on the angels so they could be fastened

The angels were taken by various families in the church who purchased the items for their adopted angel and brought their colorful Christmas bags stuffed with goodies back on December 9th. The bags were delivered to SCAC on the 12th, and on the 13th Jay and Suzie Lotven went to SCAC to hand out the gift bags to the families. Interestingly, there were three different Valdez families, so more than half of the children were Valdezes!

Below is a first-hand report from Suzie Lotven. She and Jay went to SCAC and joined with people from other member churches in handing out the gift bags to the families.

“We arrived at the church at about 9:40. We went into this large gym-like room where there were lines of presents with poles at the front of each to identify which group each one belonged to. Ours was the shortest group as the other churches were much larger than ours. At about 10:00 they all gathered together for a prayer. The people then started coming in to pick up their gifts. We had one family early and then not another one for a long time. Meanwhile Jay talked to one of the women in charge and found out that individuals are allowed to come only one time a month, on a Tuesday, for food. On each Tuesday in October

they told the ones that came of the chance to apply for gifts. This is how the lists were made. They are required to have a utility bill, an ID and their children’s social security numbers. We waited for quite awhile until I finally called the last few families to come pick up their gifts. While we waited I helped quite a few times translating for those who did not speak English. All in all we had a good time and met some very nice people. They seemed really glad we joined them.”

This was an exciting and fun way for us to participate in SCAC’s ministry. Since we are the “new kids on the block,” it was a great way to start our relationship with them and with the neighborhood. Well done, Westside!


