member of Westside, Dr. Loehr asserts there are little



## UUA Applauds Voting Rights Act Renewal

The United States Senate acted on July 20, 2006 to renew the Voting Rights Act of 1965. By a unanimous vote of 98-0, the Senate extended key provisions of the VRA, which was created to protect minority voting rights, and which has been called one of the most effective pieces of civil rights legislation in history. The House has already approved an identical version of the bill, and President Bush supported the legislation, so the Senate's vote marked the final hurdle. Reacting to the decision, UUA President William G. Sinkford wrote:

"As we rejoice in this victory for democracy, let us also take a moment to honor the courage and sacrifice of those who first fought for the passage of the Voting Rights Act forty years ago."

Unitarian Universalists have a unique historical connection to the Voting Rights Act. Many Unitarians and Universalists fought to advance the cause, including Viola Liuzzo and the Rev. James Reeb, who were killed while working for civil rights in Selma, Alabama, just a few months before the passage of the 1965 Act. In 2005, Rev. Sinkford was presented with New Democracy's James Reeb New Democracy Service Award in a Massachusetts ceremony.

Last year, two UU congregations joined an Atlanta voting rights march commemorating the signing of the original Voting Rights Act. On Sunday, June 11, 2006, the Social Action Committee of Arlington Street Church in Boston co-sponsored a gathering on voting rights with

Massachusetts Citizens for Voting Integrity. Topics included reports on the disenfranchisement of voters in Massachusetts, particularly among communities of color and immigrants, information on the national Voting Rights Act and the need for its renewal, and an examination of how redistricting has affected various groups.

As work on the VRA concluded yesterday, the UUA's Washington Office for Advocacy sent a letter to Congress urging passage of the District of Columbia Fair and Equal House Voting Rights Act (the "DC VRA") which would—for the first time ever—grant the District of Columbia a representative in Congress with full voting rights.

That letter stated, in part, "It is particularly appalling that thousands of Congressional employees—people who are serving their country as public servants—must choose between having voting representation in Congress or living in the District of Columbia. Nor is it ethical to disenfranchise the hundreds of thousands of DC residents who, in addition to deserving representation simply as US citizens, are particularly deserving because it is their lives and work that make it possible for Congress to function here.

"Two of the fundamental principles of the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations are respect for the worth and dignity of every person and the use of the democratic process. By denying one of the most basic elements of democratic governance, Congress devalues the worth and dignity of all DC residents. The lack of DC voting representation in Congress is unfair, unethical, and wrong."

## Myrtle McMahan Reports on General Assembly June 21-25, 2006

Attending General Assembly from Westside U.U. Church were Howard McMahan, delegate, Amy Youngblood, delegate, Myrtle McMahan, alternate delegate and Joyce Beck.

On opening day, the Southwest District had an ingathering where it was announced that our district had 175 persons pre-registered. That evening, Amy, carried our banner in the parade. Opening ceremony is always impressive. Over 4,000 people were in attendance (not always at all things) and when we sang, it really stirred everyone. Pathways Church was welcomed as a new Unitarian Universalist congregation.

First thing Thursday morning, I attended a workshop on the Passover Seder, put on by an organization called UU's for Jewish Awareness. This was followed by its annual meeting where I was elected treasurer. I have been their membership chair the past few years, and the organization was not very active. With the election of a new board, that will change. We are an organization that tries to encourage congregations to celebrate the Jewish holidays and include Jewish heritage as part of our UU curriculum. It has various tools available on its web site to assist in doing so. We had a booth in the exhibit hall, and I worked there on two afternoons. I did buy a Passover Hagadah (the book of ritual for the Passover Seder). It is more current than the one we have used in the past.

Amy spent part of her General Assembly minding the booth of the Southwest Unitarian Universalist Women,

selling chances on the quilt made by our women at the annual women's conference held here last year. Howard spent time minding the booth for the new U.U.A. Health Insurance Program. He sits on a U.U.A. committee that has developed a new health insurance program for staffs of the U.U.A. and its members' congregations.

Howard and Amy attended the plenary sessions. I attended some of them as well. Various people were introduced, various committees made reports, four congregations were recognized as "Breakthrough Congregations". They showed videos on each of these and they were most impressive. Various awards were given. One of the best presentations was on the "Unitarian Universalists and the Gulf Coast". Amendments to the bylaws were presented and debated. Debate on Study Items, and Actions on Immediate Witness were mostly held in mini assemblies throughout the week. The final ironed out items were then presented to the Assembly. Global Warming was adopted as a three-year study item. The final decisions may be found by going to [www.uua.org/ga](http://www.uua.org/ga).

We also attended many workshops, choosing from 25 or more being presented all at the same time.

On Thursday night the "Service of the Living Tradition" was held. This is the service that recognizes those ministers going into preliminary fellowship, those going into final fellowship, and those retiring, as well as recognizing those who have died since the last General Assembly.

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### Update from the Committee on Ministry

The Committee on Ministry (COM) is charged with the responsibility for oversight of the health and well-being of the ministry within the congregation. To that end, the committee meets monthly with Russell to discuss issues which have arisen. The committee will hear, in confidence, any concerns in this regard which are raised by any congregant, and will seek to address them promptly and thoroughly. Similarly, the committee assists and supports the minister in his role. The committee, in addition, informs itself on matters of compensation and makes a recommendation to the Board as appropriate.

A lesser-known function of the COM is to serve in an Ombuds capacity when conflicts arise between members of the congregation, and the presence of a neutral third party may be of assistance. The congregation may expect both confidentiality and sensitivity in these matters.

Please feel free to contact any member of the COM at any time. We welcome criticism, compliments, and suggestions. The members of the committee, selected jointly by the board, minister and congregation, include Reed Bilz, Chair; John Huffman, Walter McConathy, Jane Palmer, and Maria Schmidt.

### New Books for Library

Each year when we attend General Assembly, we bring back a few books for the church library. This year we are giving "*The World's Religions*" by Houston Smith, and "*Unitarian Universalism Is a Really Long Name*" by Jennifer Dant. As soon as pockets, cards and cataloguing are complete, they will be ready for check out.

There are a number of other books that will be added to the library. They are: "*Schindler's Legacy*" by Elinor J. Brecher. It is true stories of the list of survivors; "*Ethan Frome*" by Edith Wharton; and "*Judaism - Development and Life*" by Leo Trepp.

## Dwight Brown Leadership Experience

Linda Hanratty and Jane Palmer represented Westside at this year's Dwight Brown Leadership Experience, held at Austin College in Sherman, Texas from July 14th through July 21st. Jane filled in for Beverly Archibald who could not attend because it conflicted with her scheduled knee surgery.

The DBLE is an annual, intensive training camp sponsored by the Southwest Unitarian Universalist Conference and geared for leaders or potential leaders of individual congregations. Participants study the history of Unitarian Universalism, the dynamics of group processes, and the connection between organizational development and UU heritage and ideals. All participants are expected to create and conduct a worship service during the course of the week and to sponsor an evening party. Scheduled classes and activities keep participants on the go from 7:15 a.m. until 11:30 p.m. every day, giving them a chance to build

relationships with the leaders of other congregations throughout the district.

This year's DBLE was the largest ever, with 41 participants and nine faculty and staff members. Congregations were represented from Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, and Oklahoma.

Linda and Jane report that the experience was "eye-opening", "enormously informative", and "exhausting." They encourage Westside to continue sending participants on an annual basis. They will be creating a collaborative report on the highlights that they felt were particularly relevant to this church. The report will be delivered to members of the Board, Committee on Ministry, and others who might share an interest in the information. They thank Westside for sponsoring them this year.

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## Report from the Board of Directors

The Board, in place as of July 1, is excited about the coming church year. Charles Palmer has filled the position vacated by Dick Trice, and we are eager to receive your input, and encourage you to talk to one of us and to ask questions. We are committed to good communication, but a gentle reminder of something we've overlooked will be appreciated.

The Board has identified three primary areas of focus. Those are community building/maintenance, programs, and space. We will be meeting for a special session before the end of August to discuss ways we can facilitate these. Of particular concern from a planning standpoint is the issue of space. We plan to develop a logical timeline of critical steps leading to Westside having a place to call their own. We also want to insure those things we all love about Westside, the people and the time we share with those people, are nurtured and maintained.

On July 23, the standing committees set up displays of their current work to communicate what is currently happening in our church and to offer the congregation the opportunity to make suggestions and offer assistance. We will repeat this "committee fair" in September. Working together, we can build and maintain our community and programs as we work towards moving to our own space.
