

Information Concerning a General Assembly 2006 Responsive Resolution on Racism and Classism (originally published at UUA.org)

UU Congregational Leaders:

In my role as a member of the Board of Trustees and Secretary of the UUA, I am writing to notify congregational ministers and leadership of a resolution passed on June 25, 2006, by the delegates at the General Assembly in St. Louis. The text of this resolution is the following:

“Resolved, that the Delegates to General Assembly are charged to work with their congregations to hold at least one program over the next year to address racism or classism, and to report on that program at next year’s General Assembly.”

The bylaws of the UUA provide for responsive resolutions in response to a substantive portion of a report delivered at the GA either by an officer of the Association or a committee. The resolution above was moved and passed in response to reports presented by officers at the 2006 GA and the report of the Special Review Commission appointed by the UUA President and Moderator to review the events surrounding the 2005 General Assembly in Fort Worth, Texas. Both the relevant 2006 officers’ reports and the Special Review Commission report concerned events at the General Assemblies that affected Unitarian Universalist communities of color, especially youth of color.

Some of our member congregations have done significant work on issues of racism, classism, and multiculturalism using resources provided by both the UUA and other sources of expertise. If your congregation has done such work, this resolution provides an opportunity to share your efforts and accomplishments with other congregations in your cluster or district so they can benefit from your experience. Resources and suggestions for programs provided by the UUA can be found online.

This resolution was not on the GA agenda. It was written by a GA delegate, offered as a responsive resolution, and overwhelmingly supported by the delegates from over 600 UU congregations. I urge you to use this resolution as an opportunity to reflect on how your congregation is engaging with the issues of anti-racism, anti-oppression, and multiculturalism. When delegates representing our congregations gather at 2007 General Assembly in Portland, Oregon, we will have an opportunity to share our experiences in congregationally-based programs on issues of racism and classism.

Community Conversations Series Hosted by the Social Justice Committee

On Thursday, October 26th from 6:30 -8:30 pm, the YWCA Racial Equality Department will conduct a 2-hour overview of its new program *Dialogue on Race* hosted by Westside Unitarian Universalist Church, now meeting at Angel of Hope Church, 901 Page St. YWCA’s *Dialogue on Race* is unique in Tarrant County in that it promotes action through honest dialogue. The *Dialogue* is not a class, seminar, or support group. Rather, it is a unique opportunity for women and men of diverse cultures to speak frankly and safely about racial issues while learning from each other about the repercussions of prejudice and institutional racism. The Dialogue is led by two trained facilitators who guide the participants by ground rules of honesty, respect, attentive listening, and voicing of fears and feelings grounded in personal experience. The two focus areas the YWCA will highlight are:

Reaching Common Ground Exploring the Power and Prevalence of Racism

The November 21st topic will be *Your Refugee Neighbors in Tarrant County: Where Do They Come From, How Do They Get Here, What is Their Future?* Since the 1970s, large numbers of refugees, asylees and victims of human trafficking have resettled in Tarrant County. The numbers have been down in recent years but for the past five years the statistics are:

2001 - 552	2002 - 366	2003 - 344
2004 - 470	2005 - 507	

You might be surprised to learn that the most famous trafficking case happened in the Fairmount area about four years ago!

There is a very large Vietnamese population living in Arlington and the Haltom City area and a significant Bosnian population sprinkled across southwest Fort Worth and a large Somali Bantu community in east Fort Worth. The Kurds live primarily in south Arlington and the Sudanese all over. There are several Congolese churches in HEB and a Sudanese church in the Wedgewood area. The next large group to be resettled by the three Tarrant County resettlement agencies is the ethnic minority Burmese who have spent more than two decades as internally displaced persons in Thailand. What kind of help will these large families need and how will they be doing ten years from now?

This presentation is a preview for Westside’s sponsorship of a table featuring refugee crafts and music at the annual Alternative Holiday Bazaar at First Jefferson UU Church the first weekend in December. It is also an opportunity to learn about the refugees, asylees and victims of human trafficking who are your neighbors in Tarrant County. Please mark your calendars for Tuesday, November 21st and join us to learn more.

CROP WALK

As a member of the Tarrant Area Community of Churches (TACC), Westside UU Church will be participating in the 23rd annual CROP WALK. This year's Crop Walk will be on November 5th at Texas Christian University.

Each year, some 2,000 communities across the U.S. sponsor CROP WALKS. Our local agency designated to receive funds from CROP is the Tarrant Area Food Bank. TAFB provides food, resources and nutrition education to over 13 counties and will receive one-fourth of the funds raised. The remaining funds will go to Church World Service to alleviate hunger and poverty in 80 countries throughout the world. Church World Service is a cooperative ministry of 36 denominations, providing sustainable self-help and development, disaster relief, and refugee assistance around the world.

Nationally, upwards of 200 corporations match employee gifts and/or volunteer hours to the CROP WALK. Locally, thousands of businesses and media outlets support their community's CROP WALK, providing T-shirts and other supplies, turning out teams of Walkers, etc.

Through the years local churches, in partnership with Church World Service, have resettled some 400,000 refugees here in the U.S.

Around the world, Church World Service assists people under duress from circumstances beyond their control – drought and dislocation, gunfire and guerilla warfare, earthquakes, and economic upheavals, high winds and high waters.

Elder Cohousing Addressed

An exciting new opportunity is presenting itself to the members and friends of the Unitarian Universalist Churches in North Texas. The NTAUUS is sponsoring three meetings on elder cohousing in October. These will look at cohousing as an alternative to the usual options for the elderly.

According to Zev Paiss of the Elder Cohousing Network, "People who are interested in elder cohousing really want to change the current culture surrounding aging." The Network believes that cohousing addresses the need for reasonable housing costs, provides interaction and involvement by residents, provides for better communities, and helps residents determine the structure of their community. It is typically more environmentally responsible as well.

Parker J. Palmer Visits the Metroplex

Texas Wesleyan University is proud to be one of the sponsors for Dr. Parker J. Palmer’s October visit to the Metroplex.

Parker J. Palmer, author of *A Hidden Wholeness* and *Let Your Life Speak*, will speak and respond to questions about vocation, spirit and life journey on Thursday evening October 12th at the University of Texas at Arlington. The following morning, he will be the keynote speaker and will facilitate a session entitled “Reconnect who you are with what you do.” This will be followed by afternoon vocational sessions led by Courage & Renewal professional facilitators. This full day of professional development offers continuing education credits to participants from a variety of professions.

The *Evening with Parker Palmer* (\$20) and the *Day of Professional Development* (\$105) are open to any interested individuals and are particularly geared toward educators, clergy, congregational leaders, health care practitioners, legal professionals, community leaders, and other helping professions. Registration is through the Courage & Renewal North Texas office (www.couragenorthtexas.org).

Dr. Palmer is a highly respected writer, teacher and activist who focuses on issues in education, community, leadership, spirituality and social change. He has worked with people in many walks of life, including public schools, college and universities, religious institutions, corporations, foundations, and grass roots organizations. He served for 15 years as Senior Associate of the American Association of Higher Education, and now serves as Senior Advisor to the Fetzer Institute. Ten years ago, he founded the national Center for Courage & Renewal, which oversees the “Courage to Teach” program for K-12

educators across the country and parallel programs for people in other professions. Locally, the work is carried out by the Courage & Renewal - North Texas.

For eight years Courage & Renewal -North Texas has worked to provide personal and professional renewal experiences for educators and other leaders in North Texas so that they might increase commitment to vocation and deepen the ability to approach life and work with integrity and authenticity.

“Courage work” is based on the premise that everyone has an inner source of truth and guidance (soul, spirit, heart) and that certain practices can help us better connect who we are (our inner lives) with what we do (our work in the world.)

Parker Palmer has also published seven books, a dozen poems and more than one hundred essays. His work has been recognized with eight honorary doctorates, two Distinguished Achievement Awards from the National Educational Press Association, an Award of Excellence from the Associated Church Press, and major grants from the Danforth Foundation, the Lilly Endowment, and the Fetzer Institute. He received a Ph.D. in sociology from the University of California at Berkeley. A member of the Religious Society of Friends (Quaker), he lives with his wife, Sharon, in Madison, Wisconsin.

The following books are new:

The Gospel of Judas edited by Rodolphe Kasser, Marvin Meyer, and Gregor Wurst . It is one of the greatest historical discoveries of the twentieth century.

C.G. Jung – Dreams Translation by R.F.C. Hull. Jung's approach to dreams and his methods for interpreting them have influenced generation of psychologists and students of the mind.

When God Was a Woman by Merlin Stone. The question most pressing—perhaps the one that has most insistently caused this book to come into being—is this: What effect did the worship of the female deity actually have upon the status of women in the cultures in which She was extolled?

Drawing Down the Moon by Margot Adler. This classic book is “the best and most comprehensive study of Neo Paganism.” –Theodore Roszak. Margot Adler was the theme speaker at the Southwest Women's Conference two years ago.

Tao Te Ching by Lao Tzu, Introduction and notes by Yi-Ping Ong. Taoism emphasizes “non-dualistic” thinking and the interconnectedness of all life.

The Wisdom of Forgiveness, Intimate Conversations and Journeys by His Holiness The Dalai Lama and Victor Chan. The book presents a remarkable portrait of this great leader, as we've never seen him before.

I Ching, Navigate life's transitions using ancient oracles of the I Ching by Antonia and Bill Beattie. Find inner peace in taking charge of your own destiny.

We Will Make A River, The Absence of the Father & The Dance of the Zygotes, Coming of Age in Oklahoma. Poems by Mary McAnally. She is a poet with a keen eye who looks and does not shrink from seeing.

The World's Religions by Huston Smith. The book explores the essential elements and teachings of the world's predominant faiths.

ISLAM a Very Short Introduction by Malise Ruthven. The author is a lecturer in comparative religion, specializing in Islamic affairs, at the University of Aberdeen.

A “Welcoming Congregation”

Twenty-eight Westsiders met on September 10th and agreed to set Westside UU on the path to becoming a UUA-sanctioned “Welcoming Congregation” to people who are gay, lesbian, bisexual, or transgender. Dr. Russell Elleven will lead six educational sessions as part of this process: October 8th, November 5th, December 3rd, January 14th, February 11th, and March 11th.

An extensive review of all church publications, including the Bylaws, will be conducted to insure that Westside is using inclusive language and affirmative nondiscriminatory terminology. Additionally, Westside must agree to use the UU sexuality education program “Our Whole Lives” and participate in various community outreach efforts.

Completion of this process will allow Westside to use the UUA's Welcoming Congregation icon in all of its advertising and public outreach efforts.

Getting to Know You

resources, expanded their sense of ministry, and strengthened their congregational life in ways that are most welcome, and often surprising.

We will begin our October 22nd discussion with the topic "Approval". The session will begin at 10:00 and conclude by 11:00. Your participation and subsequent feedback will help us determine if this program is a good fit for our congregation. If you are new to the congregation, we anticipate this being a great way to get to know others quickly. If you've been a part of the congregation for some time, we anticipate this being a great way for you to share yourself with newcomers and to learn more about both them and those you've known for some time.
