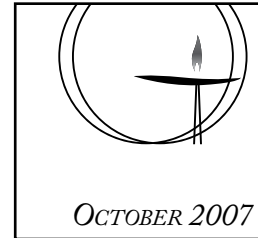

Service Project News for October

Starting this new church year on July 1st, Westside adopted a new approach to funding our service projects. Each month, non-designated plate offerings are donated to a worthy recipient organization. During September, our recipient was Cancer Care of Fort Worth. Member and visitor donations have been generous – thank you!

For the month of October, the board is especially pleased to announce that the UUA’s “Now Is the Time” campaign will be our service project recipient.

In this first year of a five-year campaign to grow our faith, “Now Is the Time” will partner with Time Magazine in print and on the Web with informational advertisements and links that direct readers to their archived articles on current religious and ethical issues and to the UUA web site.

This effort marks the UUA’s first wide-scale campaign to promote Unitarian Universalism via national media in fifty years. Our month long service project supports this marketing effort by expanding upon October 14th’s “Association Sunday” (a day during which thousands of UUs across the nation, including those assembled at Westside, will simultaneously celebrate our shared commitment to Unitarian Universalism), making each Sunday in October an “Association Sunday.”

Suggestions from Westside members for future recipients of service project plate offerings are encouraged. Please route them through Charles Palmer, treasurer, at charles.palmer@tyson.com, speak to him at church, or call him at 817-233-5198. Your Board of Directors will review the recipient’s qualifications with two simple criteria: 1) “Do donations to the recipient further our church’s vision and mission?”

and 2) "Are the recipient's values in sympathy with the seven Unitarian Universalist principles?" Service project donation recipients may be repeated throughout the year based on need and number of participating recipients. All qualified recipients not chosen one month will continue to be reviewed in the following months.

The Board met with the BRIC on September 4th to discuss priorities for building repair and improvement. The decision was made to move forward, with improvements to the sanctuary as a priority. Our sanctuary will be "under construction" at least three Sundays in October as it is transformed with new paint, new carpet, a few renovations that will provide additional space for seating, and more. Your understanding, as well as your explanations of the "mess" to guests, during this time of transition will be appreciated.

The Board's regular monthly meeting was held September 18th and an additional meeting with the Landscape Architect, the BRIC, Committee on Ministry, and Committee Chairs was held September 19th. We are making good progress with the plan for the outside of our building. Please know there are many people working long hours to support our church in many ways. Your continued support is appreciated and welcome.

A FEW WAYS THAT YOU CAN PRACTICE A MORE OUTWARD ORIENTATION TO UNITARIAN UNIVERSALISM (*originally published in The Membership Journey*) By Art Brewer, First Unitarian Congregation, Toronto, Canada.



This month, challenge yourself to apply these as you move through your daily life:

1. Tell someone about a provocative thought you heard at church.
2. Wear UU jewelry and clothing
3. Tell return visitors you're glad they came back.

Some key items covered by the Board in September are the following:

- A Search Team to hire a new half-time Director of Religious Education (DRE) is forming. Our former DRE, Brian Dierolf, resigned effective the end of August due to health challenges.
- Efforts to hire a quarter-time administrative assistant are ongoing.
- A discussion of what types of items need to be presented to the Board for approval in advance was held. The items identified include fund-raising activities, monies spent outside of, or over, the budget, representation of the church at events outside of the church, and use of the building for non-church functions and activities outside the normal scope of a committee's activities. For such an item, the Board desires to understand issues related to liability, cost, other resources required, responsible party, the purpose of the function and how it relates to our mission, vision, and Principles and Purposes, and what is needed from the Board to be successful.
- We discussed the church calendar and will be providing Harry Van Dam, our webmaster, some guidelines to assist him with handling calendar requests. All events to be held in the church building must be on the calendar. Church events open to all are to be included on the calendar regardless of location. Church events such as committee meetings held in another location may be on the calendar. No events are to be scheduled on weekdays that will result in groups of people arriving before 6:15 pm without a request for approval being submitted to Russell Elleven, minister, and Brenda Baldwin, president, at least two weeks in advance (normally), and those events should be rare and considered an exception.
- The Board, and specifically Tom Woods, vice-president, is committed

to getting policies, procedures and guidelines updated as soon as possible so they can be made available to members.

Westside has been invited to, and will, join the South Central Alliance of Churches (SCAC). SCAC serves clients in zip codes 76104, 76109 and 76110. This is an interfaith group, and we look forward to seeing "Unitarian Universalist" on the list of member churches.

As always, members are welcome to attend Board Meetings on the third Tuesday of every month at 7:00 p.m. at the church. If you wish to present to the Board, please notify Brenda Baldwin in advance of the meeting. It is also helpful if you will notify Brenda if you are planning to attend as an observer so we can have space at the table for you and watch for your arrival.

BRIC Update

As always, there is much to report as it pertains to the activities of Westside's Building Repair and Improvement Committee (BRIC). Specifically, we would like to use this month's article to acknowledge a few folks outside of the BRIC who have helped us out. We also want to note current projects scheduled for completion and our reasons for selecting these projects in particular.

Acknowledgements

First, we would like to thank Ray Weil for graciously agreeing to refinish our pulpit. We are delighted to have our pulpit back, which had been damaged in the 2005 fire at our McCart location. We appreciate the time and effort Ray put into restoring it -- not only did he accomplish the task, but he completed it months ahead of our scheduled deadline.

We also want to extend our gratitude to Bill Terry who is working to improve our current sound system. We felt improved sound quality has a significant impact on the congregation's worship experience and since we had previously received a grant which, in part, went toward upgrading the

sound system, we have chosen to make upgrading our sound system a priority. Bill Terry is the PERFECT person to tackle this project – his attention to detail, his engineering background and his patience make him invaluable to the BRIC, and we are very happy to have his assistance!

We would also like to thank Gene McKeon for the numerous contributions he has made in support of the BRIC. In July, Gene agreed to step into the role of chairing the church's Building and Grounds Committee. In August, we asked Gene if he would also act as a liaison between Building and Grounds and the BRIC. Gene agreed and, shortly after accepting this role, had to "pinch hit" for the BRIC and meet with contractors during a time when several projects had been scheduled and BRIC members were unavailable. Thank you Gene for all that you do, both in this role and in the many others you fulfill!

After seven months of existence, the BRIC's project list continues to evolve and it is clear that every bit of progress is a result of the combined efforts of church members and friends. We are grateful for everyone's willingness to contribute and we are excited to see the difference each small detail makes.

And of course, we continue to ask you for more...please don't forget our scheduled workdays. Any help you can offer is of value to us, and will make a difference! Thank you in advance for your help.

Project Updates

As of the writing of this article, the BRIC has scheduled several projects which began on September 17th and are estimated to be complete by mid-October. These projects include:

- **Replace and relocate the HVAC (Heating/Ventilation and Cooling) unit located at the rear of the sanctuary.** We have known all along we needed to replace this unit and, because of the impact it had on the sound quality during the Sunday worship service, we chose to move it to the roof.

- **This project triggered several other projects such as hiring a roofer to cut a hole in the roof for the new unit; bringing in an electrician to address associated electrical issues; and hiring painters to repair the ceiling, torn down in order to complete the HVAC improvements.** HVAC projects of this magnitude typically are not performed in the busy summer months, so we had to wait until September to begin this project. We decided it would be wise to determine what other projects would be logical for us to complete at this time. As a result, the BRIC and the Board chose to do all the others listed below.

- **Complete various electrical projects associated with the HVAC project and while the ceiling is torn down, address any other electrical issues that will enable us to enhance our sound quality.** Since we already had an electrician on site, we thought it would be more cost effective to explore what steps we could take to prepare for sound enhancements, whether we addressed them now or in the future.

- **Hire a sound consultant to help us make wise, long-term decisions and hopefully prevent rework in the future.** The sound professional offered up advice impacting HVAC work, our electrician and even some of other tasks. Bill Terry helped us find the right professional to help us out in this area.

- **Tear down the wall surrounding the old HVAC unit.** We chose to do this because we felt we needed to take every step possible to allow for more seating in our growing congregation.

- **Remove the small, lower stage located at the front of the sanctuary.** This was another step taken to allow for more seating.

- **Remove one set of the double doors entering the rear of the sanctuary, then sheet rock and paint the wall.** This was not part of our original plans,

but we decided that - since one entry is never used - we would simply cover it up. We also thought this would provide us with a unique space to hang the congregation's nametags, since our current nametag holder is running out of space (another great problem to have!!).

- Patch holes and paint the entire sanctuary. Tearing down the walls, repairing the ceiling (both where the HVAC unit repairs took place and at the front of the sanctuary where the leaks from the roof have occurred in the past), covering up the doors, etc. all result in the need to apply a fresh coat of paint throughout the entire sanctuary.

- Remove and replace the carpet in the sanctuary, hallway, offices and library. Our carpet in the sanctuary is stained and mismatched and the carpet in the hallway/offices is dated and need of repair. We felt replacing the carpet would have a significant impact on the overall appearance of our interior and will provide the finishing touch for this round of interior upgrades!

Choosing to complete all of these interior projects was a difficult decision. There is much to do and only so much money currently available. On September 4, BRIC members met with the board to discuss our overall project list and determine whether we would proceed with all these interior improvements, knowing that we still need to improve things on the building's exterior. After some discussion, it was agreed to do this thorough renovation of the interior rather than selectively completing only a portion of both the interior and exterior improvements. A piecemeal approach would have increased the overall cost to eventually complete all the projects as well as leaving us with incomplete projects on both the interior and exterior.

We are excited about the end-results of this phase of project work, and we hope you are all happy with the improved sound quality and the fresh, clean appearance achieved through these interior projects.

Planning for the exterior projects is ongoing. The Board, BRIC and committee representatives met with our Landscape Architect in September to review the work he has done to date and to give him input before the next phase of his work. When the final plan is in place, the Board will work with us to decide how best to proceed with exterior Repair and Improvements.

There is so much excitement and energy among our Religious Education group this year! We've started our new RE year with our new curriculum, and teachers and students alike are revved up. If you haven't checked us out before, don't waste any time. We meet during the latter half of the church service but look for our bulletin board in the hallway with pictures and reviews of events, or just ask any of our students or teachers! Check out some of our future events:

Children's Halloween Party

On October 27th from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m., please join us at church for one of the best parties of the year. There will be lots of games, contests, prizes, and food - and of course - our spooky piñata. Our youth group will be helping to run the games, and they plan on bringing a dunking machine - careful not to get volunteered for that one!!

Westside UU Youth

Our teens are very busy, meeting every Sunday at 12:30 pm at church. They alternate Sundays between discussing our curriculum "UU's according to the Simpsons" and going to do some fun activity.

RE is off to a great start in its new year. On September 9th, seven teens and their leaders watched an episode of the Simpsons and discussed the topic of what is really important in life; what would you do if you only had 24 hours to live? They also shared feelings about the commemoration of September 11th and opinions of where the world is now because of those events. They will meet for another session, using this curriculum, on September 23rd.

On September 30th, the teens will be meeting to plan more upcoming events, things for having fun, for raising money, and for helping out in various ways.

On October 20th, they will be visiting a haunted house and then will be helping to run the games at the children's Halloween Party on October 27th. On November 4th they hope to attend a ropes course for team and leadership building. In December, they hope to be going to play paintball. You've Been Flocked!!

To help raise money for the Youth Group activities, the teens would like the congregation to participate in an activity called "Flocking". The youth will leave a calling card to inform the person that they have just been "flocked" by

the youth group, courtesy of that certain person. 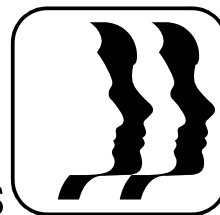

New Faces



Welcome Nancy VanBoskirk
Nancy VanBoskirk, one of our new members, is an accomplished addition to our congregation. The first time Nancy came to Westside, she came to preach a Sunday

sermon. Nancy, an ordained Disciples of Christ minister, conducted the funeral service for a hospice patient for whom Linda McConathy was a volunteer. Walt and Linda attended the service and were impressed with Nancy, invited her to Westside, and Nancy, in turn, was impressed with us. She says that one of the things she likes best about Westside is the people.

Born in Guymon, Oklahoma, in the panhandle, Nancy moved to Batavia, New York, when she was fourteen. Her family – parents and two sisters – enjoyed traveling, so the family had many interesting travel experiences together. Nancy says she has seen Niagara Falls from all sides and in all seasons, even when the American side was “turned off” for repairs.

She returned to Oklahoma for college, graduating from Phillips University in Enid. Nancy was married by the time she finished college, and has two daughters, Laura and Amy. Laura lives with her husband in Steamboat Springs, and Amy, whom Nancy calls “a natural healer”, is coming to Fort Worth to live with Nancy while she works on getting her massage therapy license and masters in acupuncture.

Nancy was a sociology major in college, but, coming from a long line of ministers, eventually ended up at Brite Divinity School and became an ordained minister. After being an associate pastor at Hurst Christian Church, she found her ministerial niche as a hospice chaplain, working for VITAS Hospice Care in Fort Worth for eight years.

When asked why she left the ministry, Nancy says that feminism was what precipitated her decision; the patriarchal structure of the church was stifling to her and went against her principles. Also, after an extensive investigation of her own theology/Christology she recognized she could no longer legitimately call herself a Christian.

She and her husband started a TRIO program at Temple College called Student Support Services, a component of which
