December 23rd - *Carols and Lessons*. At the center of the holiday season, we'll commemorate the moment with music and readings and fun and games.

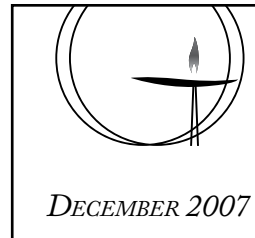

December 2nd – *Emerson and the Idea of America* facilitated by Tom Woods. We begin our discussion of Emerson with a look at his life and times because his life was so closely tied to his works, and his works produced a vision of America that is still with us today. Emerson's expansive vision placed few limits on the powers of the new nation or on the individuals who contributed to its democracy. "Self Reliance" was a concept that summed up an entire philosophy of life. Just as each soul participated in the soul of the universe, so each American had a right to participate in the wider body politic. In addition, Emerson's idea of an Over-Soul allowed for a wide range of believers and non-believers to participate in religious free thinking. His ideas emphasized the liberty of each individual and the roles individuals played in the formation of the state.

December 9th – *Emerson and Transcendentalism* facilitated by Brenda Baldwin. Emerson's lectures and published essays gave form to the sometimes amorphous range of Transcendental ideas. Although Emerson was a Unitarian minister, he left the ministry when he felt his ideas were too liberal for the pulpit. In his search for religion, he developed ideals for countless others to follow. The Transcendental Club, which he helped to form, was a gathering of individuals who were suspicious of organized religion. Emerson set forth a powerful idea that still echoes today when he wrote "Nature is the symbol of the spirit."

December 16 – *The Month That Was* facilitated by Dick Trice. Please join in an open discussions of the important events of the previous month. As world ideas and events get ever more complex and crucial, it behooves us to be informed. Come to share, compare, and sharpen your thoughts with others.

December 23rd – *Emerson's Influence* facilitated by Brenda Baldwin. Emerson was one whose thoughts were adopted by others almost immediately. He developed perspectives that rapidly influenced educational theory, theological and religious practice, and political debate. Emerson's theological speculations lie behind a whole range of modern ideas about the dangers of religious extremism and dogmatism.

Wanted: UU Pen Pals for UU Prisoners

Looking for a social justice project that UUs can do alone or in groups, in their own homes, whenever it's convenient? Over 300 prisoners have joined the Church of the Larger Fellowship (CLF) seeking liberal spiritual support by mail. About half are writing to a (non-incarcerated) UU pen pal through CLF's "Letter-Writing Ministry," but dozens more CLF prisoner-members are still on the waitlist.

All letters to/from prisoners are sent by mail (so UUs without web/email can participate), and all letters from prisoners are forwarded through CLF's prison ministry (prisoners are told only their pen pal's first name). The CLF's prison ministry staff makes pen pal matches and remains available for advice/support. Individual UUs are welcome to apply, or a group from the same congregation can apply and ask to be matched at the same time to form an ongoing study/support group.

UUA Begins Fire Relief Fund to Help Southern Californians

Dear Friends:

I want to thank you all from the depth of my heart. You have all responded with great concern, help, and kindness. The calls and e-mails offering help number in the hundreds. To date (November 12) we have received more than fifty thousand dollars from congregations and individuals here in Southern California and from across the continent to help those devastated by the fires. We are connected to Unitarian Universalists around the nation and world who really care about what happens.

I have spent some time in San Diego working with members of the Trauma Ministry and the leadership of our congregations. At this stage we are still hearing from those who were in the way of the fires. We know that one family from our Chalice congregation lost a home, another lost a good portion of their home, and a number of families had the fires literally stop at their door. Numerous families have

major smoke damage needing professional help to make their homes livable again. Our PSWD Fire Relief Fund Panel has been able to respond quickly to the needs of families in our congregations, thanks to the generosity of other UUs. The Fund Panel and I will continue to explore how to best help people. At this stage we do not know of needs beyond financial. when I do know I will contact each congregation. Our experience tells me that the recovery will take months and years. We will work with our laity and ministers in need for as long as it takes. If you would still like to help financially please see below for where to send donations.

These funds will go (in order) to UU congregations in need, UU families and individuals in need, community groups our congregations are working with who serve those most in need, and other groups working with those most in need. This year Westside will be participating in South Central Alliance of Churches' (SCAC) Angel Tree, to provide gifts of toys and clothing to needy children.

We have chosen twenty children, ten girls and ten boys from six different families, ranging in age from infants to eleven-year-olds. If there are multiple children from one family registered, Westside has all the angels for those children. Angels will be available for you to select on Sundays at church, from November 18th through December 2nd. The Angels (green for boys and red for girls) will have information about each child's name, clothing sizes and "toy wishes".

You are asked to purchase one outfit for your child, as well as a toy for him or her. If the toy needs batteries, please include them as well. Although not formally a part of the program, Westside members are also encouraged to include one age-appropriate book.

Please bring all gift bags to church no later than December 9th. We will need volunteers to take the gifts to SCAC on Wednesday, December 12th; and, - the fun part - volunteers are also needed on Thursday, December 13th, from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm to distribute the gifts to the families we selected.

Service Project News for December

Westside continues to enjoy success with our new plan for service projects. Each month, non-designated plate offerings are donated to a worthy recipient organization. During November, our recipient has been the South Central Alliance of Churches. Westside is its newest member, and your generous donations help support its outreach to local individuals and families in need.

For the month of December, the board is pleased to announce that the Somali-Bantu Empowering Women Program will be our service project recipient. The program is a collective of refugee Somali-Bantu women that have gathered in the local area and are producing and selling native craft works to support their new lives here. The Somali-Bantu immigrant community faces unusual challenges adapting to life in the U.S.A. due to an absence of an existing group of alike refugees, lack of mar-

ketable job skills, and unfamiliarity with Western life. Our donations will provide this worthy local women's micro business seed funding for their craft supplies.

Suggestions from Westside members for future recipients of service project plate offerings are encouraged. Please route them through Charles Palmer, treasurer, at charles.palmer@tyson.com, speak to him at church, or call him at 817-233-5198. Your Board of Directors will review the recipient's qualifications with two simple criteria: 1) "Do donations to the recipient further our church's vision and mission?" and 2) "Are the recipient's values in sympathy with the seven Unitarian Universalist principles?" Service project donation recipients may be repeated throughout the year based on need and number of participating recipients. All qualified recipients not chosen one month will continue to be reviewed in the following months. 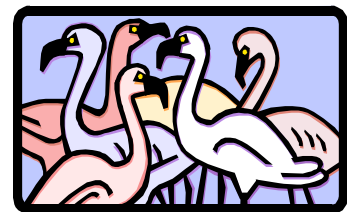
Teachers' Conference
