CHANGES MADE IN SERVICE TIMES

The Sunday service time has been changed from 11:15 to 11:30 a.m. This change is intended to allow for a more fluid transition following the Angel of Hope service. The "Coffee and Fellowship" time that previously followed the service will now precede the service at 11:00 a.m. Adult Forum has temporarily been canceled, until a new chairperson is found. Choir is temporarily cancelled until fall. The monthly potluck lunch will still be on the third Sunday of each month, following the service.



UUA Responds on Gulf Coast Relief Fund

June 13, 2006

Dear Westside Unitarian Universalist Church,

On behalf of the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations and the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee I would like to thank you and the members of your congregation for your tremendous generosity.

Because of donors like those in your community, we have been able to raise more than three million dollars for the Gulf Coast Relief Fund. Unitarian Universalists and hundreds and hundreds of like-minded individuals from all over the country showed a visionary generosity and real compassion when, within hours of Hurricane Katrina's strike, we opened our homes and hearts and made significant financial donations to survivors of this tragedy.

We received donations from children and youth groups, social groups, and over 600 UU congregations and their members. "I have enclosed," one woman explained, "a \$25 money order directly from my wonderful son's piggy bank. It made him feel good to do this, and it made me proud." Many other donors expressed a version of this man's sentiment: "Thank you for ensuring my small donation will get to those most in need." When we were needed most we stood on the side of hope and love through acts of faith.

So far, your gifts to the Relief Fund have made it possible for us to provide funding to the three UU churches hit hardest by the hurricanes, to help residents of the Gulf Coast access aid and develop a vision of how reconstruction will occur, to help protect immigrant workers in the area, to coordinate human-rights and social justice efforts in the communities and neighborhoods of New Orleans, provide legal support for those in need, and to represent displaced families from the most marginalized and most needy impacted communities. That is just the beginning.

I am excited to be able to bring you and your whole congregation news of this Gulf Coast Relief Fund, and to

announce that the UUA has prepared a report in regard to your contributions and how the funds are being put to use. It is our hope that the Stewardship Report on the UUA UUSC Gulf Coast Relief Fund will provide you with the information you need in order to know that you have played an important part in this historic moment for Unitarian Universalism and all people of conscience. Please share this exciting information with as many people in your congregation as possible.

This report is part of our ongoing commitment to be transparent and accountable to our donors. We hope to see you and delegates from your church at GA this year, where we hope you will be able to stop by the Stewardship and Development exhibit and pick up a copy. Statement from the Rev. William G. Sinkford on the Failed Federal Marriage Amendment (originally published on June 6th, 2006 at UUA.org)

UUA President William G. Sinkford issued the following statement following a vote in the US Senate which rejected a proposed Federal Marriage Amendment:

“The latest effort to amend the United States constitution to deny loving couples the rights and responsibilities of marriage is a blatant attempt to write discrimination into our democracy’s foundational document. This attack on American couples and families exposes the increasingly cynical efforts by the extreme right to divert the country’s attention from far more vital issues. The resounding failure of this proposed amendment is a testimony to the enduring power of the constitution, which has never been

altered with the express intent to deny equal protection to an entire class of citizens. May it never be used as a weapon against any of “we the people,” but instead be preserved in sacred trust as a guarantee of freedom and liberty for all Americans.

“This amendment was a shameful attempt to divide the American people. I am thankful to the thousands of Unitarian Universalists across the country who have borne witness to our liberal religious values and raised their voices to defeat this amendment and affirm that we are in fact one people.”

“Love & Logic” Parenting Classes Offered

Parents may wish to take advantage of the rare opportunity to attend the Love & Logic Classes now being offered at the church. These classes normally cost hundreds of dollars, but Ashley Ekola has donated her services as an independent trainer. This means that the first four classes will be free and only a nominal fee will be charged in September to cover the costs of workbooks and childcare. There are seven classes total, but they do not have to be attended in order. We plan to continue offering them, so any missed classes can be made up in the future.

Love & Logic is a philosophy of raising and teaching children which allows adults to be happier, empowered,

and more skilled in the interactions with children. Love allows children to grow through their mistakes. Logic allows children to live with the consequences of their choices. Love & Logic is a way of working with children that puts parents and teachers back in control, teaches children to be responsible, and prepares young people to live in the real world, with its many choices and consequences.

Love & Logic offers adults an alternative way to communicate with children. The Love & Logic techniques produce immediate results because the techniques are simple, practical and easy to learn. The concepts behind Love & Logic place a heavy emphasis on respect and dignity for children and, at the same time, allow parents to grasp simple approaches instead of learning difficult counseling procedures.

Canvass Results Announced

Howard McMahan, chair of the Finance Committee, reports that the annual canvass week resulted in total pledges of \$90,847. Sixty-one "units" made pledge promises for the year ahead, and the average pledge per unit was \$1,489. "We much appreciate the work of the finance committee members," says Howard.
