Westside's Building Dedication

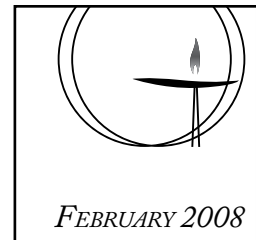

Thirteen years after a few Unitarian Universalists began meeting in homes in west Fort Worth, and with the support of Westside's members and friends, Westside accomplished a "first" with the purchase of real estate at 901 Page Avenue in historic Ryan Place in March of 2007. As we approach the one-year anniversary of closing on the purchase of 901 Page Avenue, we are dedicating our building and celebrating both the calling of Dr. Russell Elleven as full-time minister and a more than 25% membership growth in the past year.

Our new property was the home of Unity Church of Fort Worth for many years. Angel of Hope Christian Church, a progressive and welcoming Disciples of Christ church, bought the property from Unity and later leased space to the Montessori pre-school previously housed at the adjacent St. John's Episcopal Church. The Montessori pre-school remains at Westside as a tenant and as a fulfillment of our mission. As you know if you've been to Westside recently,

we've made significant progress with the interior of our building, and we plan to make a solid start on the exterior before March 2nd.

Please show your support of our church, and celebrate our success by participating in this important day in the life of our church. Members, friends and guests of all ages will gather in the sanctuary at 4:00 p.m. for a service of dedication to include music, the honoring of our founders and donors, and words of remembrance, dedication and celebration. The festivities continue with a reception immediately following the service of dedication. (We will also have our usual Sunday morning activities on March 2nd, including Adult Forum at 9:45 and Worship featuring Katie Sherrod as guest speaker at 11:00.)

Westside is a member of SCAC, and Jane Hansen has agreed to represent us on their Board. They are the agency through which we gave the angel tree gifts at Christmas. Tiel Jensen, who is in charge of the pantry, has told us that their primary need at this time is for canned meats or fish. If you will bring canned meat or canned fish items to church on Sundays during February, Suzie and Jay Lotven have agreed to take them to SCAC for us.

In the past, we have been able to help out with WestAid's food pantry. Hopefully, we can be active participants in SCAC's pantry as well.

Civil Rights Bus Tour: March 22nd - 30th

With your generous end-of-year gifts, the Campaign has reached 74% of its \$50 million goal. This includes \$15.5 million in cash and pledges and \$21.5 million in legacy commitments.

In the December 31st (most widely read) issue of Time magazine, Vladimir Putin was named Person of the Year. Pages 164 to 165 featured Unitarian Universalism's second advertorial, made possible only by Association Sunday and your many individual contributions!

What else do your gifts support? This advertorial directs readers to Time magazine's Religion Pages online, and a welcoming UUA landing page including Unitarian Universalist perspectives on some of the most controversial and sensitive religious issues of our time, along with the video entitled Voices of a Liberal Faith, and tools to find a congregation!

And as a result of all this, the Chicago Tribune gave our faith some great press for free on December 28, 2007!

The Friends of the UUA ended 2007 with an appeal on peacemaking. At the end of this month, President Sinkford will be sending a letter about National Awareness in an effort to inform even more Friends about the Time campaign.

The Annual Program Fund is making great progress toward goal. To date, the fund has reached \$3,239,149, or 46.1% of its highest ever \$7,019,739 goal. A total of 190 congregations have fulfilled their pledges, including 141 con-

gregations giving at the full Fair Share level. Many thanks to the members of the Annual Program Fund Committee who work tirelessly to promote a culture of generosity across our Association and make this fund as effective as it can be.

SMART Group Meeting at Westside

Through a grant obtained by the Humanists of Fort Worth (www.hofw.org), Westside is hosting Self Management and Recovery Training (SMART) meetings. These meetings, facilitated by our minister, are an alternative to 12 Step recovery programs. The SMART program is based upon cognitive behavioral techniques and does not require the participant to believe in a higher power or to deem themselves powerless. The meetings occur each Tuesday evening at 7:00 p.m. and are confidential.

Mid-Year Congregational Meeting Held

Following the January potluck lunch, Westsiders met for the semi-annual congregational meeting on Sunday, January 20th as required in the Westside bylaws.

Dr. Russell K. Elleven opened the meeting with a review of his plans for the next six months, which include moving from half-time to full-time ministry and his new outreach ministry programs: the Relationship

Enhancement Group (REG) which will provide participating couples with a monthly night out – including some specific exercises, followed by dinner and a movie; and the Self-Management and Recovery Training (SMART), a drug/alcohol recovery program that offers a secular approach as an alternative to the traditional AA programs.

Next, Brenda Baldwin delivered the President's Report. Brenda reported that worship service attendance trends are up from the last two years and noted that six of the top ten highest attended services were when Dr. Elleven was in the pulpit. Plate collections for the first six months have allowed Westside to donate over \$5,000 to its selected service project recipients (as opposed to approximate \$2200 for the same time period last year.) She gave attendees a demonstration on how to use the church website to access the calendar, webmaster, Weekly Web, and newsletter. Attendees were also reminded that the church is closed on Tuesday evenings from 7:00 to 9:00 to protect the privacy of the SMART group participants. She discussed the fact that Westside is without a Social Justice Committee chairperson. Finally, she closed with the good news that membership is "well over 100 for the first time in our history".

After this, a straw poll was conducted to vote on whether or not Westside should form an ad hoc committee to consider the possibility of a name change for the church. Attendees voted 24 – 6 in favor of said committee formation.

Then Gayle Elleven delivered the Building Repair and Improvement Committee (BRIC) Report. Gayle thanked all committee members and ad hoc members for their help, singling out Maria Schmidt, Jill Jung, Gene McKeon, and Brenda Baldwin for their outstanding efforts. She

announced that many exterior improvements are planned for February, in preparation for the building dedication ceremony which is scheduled for March 2nd. These include working on the flower beds, thinning trees, improving the appearance of sidewalks and entryway, and painting doors and railings. Finally she reviewed the BRIC's balance sheet with attendees.

Next, Charles Palmer delivered the Treasurer's Report for the first six months of Westside's fiscal year. He reported the good news that Westside is financially healthy and has produced income in excess of the budgeted minimums.

Finally, Bill Terry (as Chair of the Stewardship Committee and as a member of the Finance Committee) made a Stewardship Presentation. He explained that Westside now has a "Program Budget" in addition to its ongoing "Line-Item Budget". The Program Budget categorizes Westside's expenses according to the broader program intentions of the expense. The program categories are "Denominational Connections", "Community Within", "Lifespan Religious Education", "Community Outreach", "Income Generation", and "Worship and Music." For the first six months of the fiscal year, the largest income generators were
