Meet the Teacher

I want to introduce you to some of our teachers so you will get to know who is teaching your children.

Andrea Petty is one of the teachers for the Clara Barton class. This is her second year teaching the 3-6 year olds. Andrea chose the 3- 6 year olds because her own children were not in this class, and she has enjoyed it very much.

Before joining Westside in June of 2007, Andrea had gone to the Episcopal church and taught 'Godly Play', a cousin to 'Spirit Play' which is taught in many UU churches.
