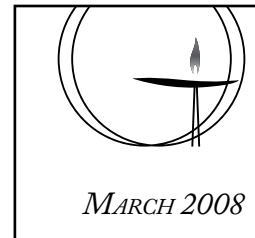

March 2nd - *The Importance of Women's Stories in Understanding a Community* by Katie Sherrod. Grace & Gumption, Stories of Fort Worth Women is our attempt to pull women's stories out of the private places where most of them reside into the light of public awareness. Our daughters and sons can never fully understand the community in which they live without knowledge of the women who helped shape it. Katie Sherrod is a writer/producer who lives in Fort Worth.

March 9th - *Under the Influence* by Dr. Russell Elleven. The influence that others have on us can be very positive. It must be admitted there are times when that influence can be less so. Russell will talk about being under the influence of another this Sunday morning.

March 16th - *The Effectiveness of Churches* by Dr. Russell Elleven. What do effective churches do? Is Westside an effective church? You'll get one person's perspective today.

March 23rd - *Easter at Westside* by Dr. Russell Elleven. This is the weekend Christians celebrate the death and resurrection of Jesus. Unlike other church services this day, Russell will be focusing on the death side of the holy day.

March 30th - *The Indians Were Right: Mother Earth is Holy* by the Rev. Marjorie Montgomery. I can hear Mother Earth talking, and is she put out! She is saying "I gave you life...You gave me acid rain, nuclear waste, toxic waste and ozone layer depletion...You gave me destroyed rain forests, mountains and wildlife, and created a greenhouse effect...You gave me polluted oceans, rivers, lakes and streams...COUGH, WHEEZE, COUGH, CHOKE, COUGH... IS THIS ANY WAY TO TREAT YOUR MOTHER?" The Rev. Marjorie Montgomery was ordained in 1977 and has served several UU churches, including First Jefferson. She was Religious Education Consultant for the Southwest District for 5 years. Today she is retired and lives here in Fort Worth with husband Duane.

March 2nd - *Louisa May Alcott* facilitated by Dr. Russell Elleven and meeting in the Fellowship Hall. Today, we usually think of Louisa May Alcott as the author of *Little Women* and the less-often read *Little Men*. She was, however, an influential member of the circle of people who contributed to the ideas of the leading Transcendentalists.

March 9th - *Margaret Fuller and Rights for Women* facilitated by Tom Woods and meeting in the Fellowship Hall. Margaret Fuller's name became synonymous with several of the main currents of Transcendentalism. She learned Latin and Greek at an early age, served as a teacher in Bronson Alcott's Temple School, as a magazine writer and editor, and also as a foreign correspondent. Her groundbreaking publications included *Woman in the Nineteenth Century*, the major work in which she argues unequivocally for equal rights for women.

March 16th - *The Month That Was* discussion group facilitated by Dick Trice and meeting in the glass-walled classroom.

March 23rd - *Transcendental Women* facilitated by Tom Woods and meeting in

the glass-walled classroom. Men in the Transcendentalist movement supported women, worked side by side with them, and argued for their rights. Women seized the mantle of their own authority and argued strongly for their own causes: religious freedom, abolition of slavery, and women's personal rights to own property, cast votes and control their destiny. This session will present a group of women who had a direct and powerful impact on Transcendentalist ways of thinking, from the three remarkable Peabody Sisters to the less well-known radical abolitionist Lydia Child and the indefatigable activist and author Caroline Dall. Lucretia Mott and Elizabeth Cady Stanton, while not directly connected to members of the Transcendentalist circle, were inspired by or helped to inspire American Transcendentalism.

March 30th - *Moncure Conway—Southern Transcendentalist* facilitated by Brenda Baldwin and meeting in the Fellowship Hall. A Southerner from a wealthy, aristocratic family, Conway embraced Transcendentalist thinking, and most notably, abolition while attending Harvard's Divinity School. He was an influential lecturer while living and preaching in England, associating with such leading lights as Carlyle, Dickens and Darwin. He evolved toward a very modern liberal humanism and eventually abandoned the organized church altogether.

The theme this year is What the World Needs from Religious Liberals and will cover a wide variety of subjects in keynote addresses, workshops, worship, and UU conversations. Invest in Predictable Income and Support Unitarian Universalism

Since the New Year, the Dow Jones Industrial Average has fallen over 200 points on seven occasions and has closed below 12,000 points for the first time since November 3, 2006. Those who rely on dividends, interest from invest-

ments, or the sale of securities may have noticed this recent decline in the markets. And while the market is readjusting, those relying on income generated by it are experiencing a financial roller coaster ride potentially resulting in one less trip to the supermarket or to the pharmacy this month.

Fortunately, there are several ways for those 55 years or older to get off of this roller coaster while retaining steady income, claiming an immediate charitable tax deduction, and supporting Unitarian Universalism. Below are two common ways to do this.

CHARITABLE GIFT ANNUITIES:

The concept of a gift annuity is relatively simple. You, wishing to support the Association, a congregation, or other Unitarian Universalist entity, make a gift to the Association. The UUA then reinvests your assets and agrees to pay out fixed payments to you for your lifetime (and, if desired, for that of another beneficiary). Upon death of the last individual beneficiary, the annuity is terminated and the remaining funds are distributed to the charitable beneficiary (the Association, a congregation, or another Unitarian Universalist entity).

CHARITABLE REMAINDER ANNUITY TRUSTS:

Annuity Trusts are a popular option for gifts of over \$100,000 and allow for greater flexibility than Charitable Gift Annuities. With this plan, the trust pays a fixed dollar amount every year for the rest of your life with no investment worries or responsibilities. After your lifetime, the trust remainder becomes available to the Association, a congregation, or other Unitarian Universalist entity of your choosing.

With Annuity Trusts you decide the amount to be paid to you each year from the trust. You may also select other individual beneficiaries, choose an event that triggers the start of annuity payments such as retirement or a birthday, and even set the number of years over which the trust will pay income before terminating.

Woods, Mary Noer, Bill Terry, James and Ardis Freeman, and Ardis's dad and his wife, Wendell and Janice Tackett. We all agreed to underwrite the project, making sure it would be paid for even if we couldn't raise funds. Luckily, that year and every year after, our families, our friends at Westside UU, and the Hispanic Administrators Association of Fort Worth have donated the funds we've needed to pay for the house. We only pay for our transportation down, our food and our lodging for the trip.

We stay in Mercedes Texas, renting a ranch house there, and drive across the border daily to the build. That first year, Carina Terry (who was one year old) and Marjorie Terry, (Carina's grandma) stayed in Texas, cooking and cleaning for us so we could eat as soon as we got back. Since that time, we've had volunteers join us who specifically go to support the building group by cooking, cleaning, and shopping.

Many members of Westside have supported us in our endeavor, both with money and with volunteers, for the last eight years. We even had enough of both to build two houses one year, although that was much tougher than we thought!

Ardis and James choose the families we build for, making sure they own the land. (This is to ensure that after we build the house, a landlord can't force the family out and charge more for the next family.) Then the Freemans arrange for all of the building supplies to be at the site when we get there (as best as is possible) and also for the foundation to be completed ahead of time. A good friend of theirs, Clemente, lives in Progresso and is our maestro, our foreman, our teacher. He is a very patient teacher and has taught all who want to learn how to lay bricks, reinforce corners, make door and window openings straight, build rafters and put on a roof, put in windows and doors – in short, how to build a house.

The family we are building for also helps as much as they can. The fathers are usually at work, but they help on their days off. The mothers bring us water, sweep up, etc. And there are always plenty of children to keep us entertained!

Bill Terry organizes the volunteers on the US side, making sure someone will be the help we need at the ranch house, accounting for all the money and collecting money from the volunteers. He and Mary publicize, raising funds and communicating with Westside donors afterward, sending thank-you notes and pictures of the build.

Wendell and Janis host before and after meetings for the volunteers. Before the build, we gather so that new volunteers can meet experienced volunteers. Both old and new volunteers watch a movie of a build, so they know what to expect and refresh their memories as to how to do things. After the build, we meet to celebrate and exchange pictures from the build.

We are grateful for all of the support we have received from everyone, especially from Westside UU church. Thank you to all!
