Private Heartache – Public Battleground

In 2007 China's death penalty executions numbered 470+. In Iran more than 317 died by order of the courts; Saudi Arabia executed over 143, that number followed closely by Pakistan's 135. The fifth highest number of state decreed executions in the world – that's the whole planet – numbered 42 and took place in the United States of America. The State of Texas executed 26 of its citizens, more than all the other 49 states combined. The remaining 16 were spread across nine other states, none of which executed more than three people.

December's newsletter introduced Ken and Lois Robison to the Westside family. Concerned and compassionate, the Robisons found their life mission in an ongoing battle to abolish the death penalty.

In 1982 their mentally ill son, Larry, having been found guilty of murder, was sent to the Ellis I unit in Huntsville, Death Row. Larry was executed by the state on January 21, 2000.

After their son entered prison, Lois and Ken became board members of TX CURE - Citizens United for the Rehabilitation of Errants. They also served as co-directors of the issue chapter HOPE - Help Our Prisoners Exist. They continue to be active with TX CURE, International CURE, the National and Texas coalitions to abolish the death penalty, Amnesty International, MVFR - Murder Victims Families for Reconciliation, and MVFHR - Murder Victims Families for Human Rights.

The couple traveled all over the USA, Europe, Scandinavia, and the Philippines with Amnesty International, CADP - Coalition to Abolish the Death Penalty, and Murder Victims Families for Reconciliation, speaking about the death penalty. In 2000 Amnesty International and the CADP named them Abolitionists of the Year.

In June, 2005 in Fort Worth, the General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association presented Ken and Lois with the Holmes-Weatherly Award for life-long commitment to faith-based Social Justice.

Don't Forget Russell's Ordination on March 8

On March 8th at 4:00 p.m., Westside Unitarian Universalist church will formally ordain Russell into the wider UU ministry. While UU congregations have the authority to ordain anyone of their choosing, Russell met with the Ministerial Fellowship Committee in early December and was given official approval by that credentialing body of the association. While there will be no change in the relationship between Russell and Westside, his ministry will now be formally recognized by the Unitarian Universalist Association.

Kool-Aid (already sweetened), Mixed Vegetables, Peanut Butter and Jelly, Macaroni, Crystal Light, Crackers and Canned Meat – including Chili, Vienna Sausage, Stew, Chicken, Fish.*
