Westside invites the public to GREEN FEST!

Westside Unitarian Universalist Church invites the public to share entertainment, games, food, raffles and other festive Earth-honoring events from 11am – 5 pm, Saturday, April 12th in the congregation's new home at 901 Page Avenue. Among the offerings will be food and beverages for sale (cash only), music and speakers on our "green stage," bakewalks, chair massages, games and crafts for all ages, and an environment-themed film – rain or shine.

Admission is free (while donations are welcome) to learn about ways to "go green" and meet some green vendors in our area. Attendees can buy raffle chances to win services or baskets filled with green products. Attendance at the day's-end ticket drawing will not be required to win baskets. A few events, such as the kids' bounce house, will require modest ticket purchases.

With this secular fundraiser the congregation celebrates and illustrates the Unitarian Universalist principle of respect for the interdependent web of all existence. Dedicated to religious pluralism, Unitarian Universalism honors all spiritual traditions that celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct people to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.

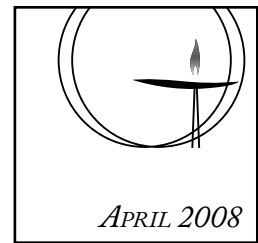
We could use more volunteers to help with the various activities. Also, we would appreciate your saving the following items for use in the kids' games and crafts:

1. Empty eggshells, just top off, rinse out and put upside down back into the egg carton – need 75 dozen
2. Bottom half of OJ or similar cartons, 1 quart size
3. Water bottle caps and similar bottle caps
4. Different sizes of glass bottles
5. Small smooth rocks
6. Cereal boxes
7. Pine cones
8. Butter tubs or larger tubs that can be cut down
9. Odds and bobs – Bettina has buttons, Sandy has bolts and nuts, etc., need small junk pieces of wood, tools, glues, etc. (things that can be used at crafts tables for found art and costumes)
10. Cardboard tubes from rolls of paper towels and toilet paper
11. Handiwipes – not antibacterial

Other items needed (be sure to put your name on everything you want to retrieve at the end):

1. Baskets/containers for displaying items for basket raffles
2. Containers with lids we can use to keep raffle tickets safe
3. Colored paper, colored newspaper ads, etc. for making raffia

5. Colorful tent canopies we can stretch across the playground or parking lot here and there

April 6 – *Justice Sunday*. Today, we stand with the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee and UU congregations nationwide. The war in Iraq has drained this nation's resources, created a humanitarian crisis in Iraq, and left a multitude of needs at home unmet – including the disgraceful lack of resources and commitment to rebuild the Gulf Coast. Today's worship service and UUSC's Simple Steps for Justice will empower us each to educate, act, and speak out.

April 13 – *The Effectiveness of Church Members*. Last month Russell talked about some characteristics of effective churches. At Westside we know that our congregation is about, and made up of, people. The people at Westside can make an effective church. Can our members be more effective?

April 20 – *Going Green?* Westside's first Green Fest has come and gone. What have we learned? What can we do? Where do we go?

April 27 – *The Teacher in Me*. Russell has spent most of his adult working career as an educator. What does that mean for and to him? What does that mean for Westside? Come hear his response this Sunday morning.

Sunday Adult Forum

9:45 SUNDAY MORNING

April 6 – *Transcendental Eccentrics* facilitated by Brenda Baldwin. Transcendentalism produced more than its share of eccentrics, and some of their viewpoints helped to create a uniquely American version of eccentricity. This lecture explores the eccentricities of Thoreau, Ellery Channing (nephew of Dr. William Ellery Channing), and Jones Very.

April 13 – *Transcendental Utopias – Living Experiments* facilitated by Russell El-

leven. Transcendentalism was not simply about those major and minor figures who developed and promulgated its doctrines. It was also about a series of attempts at new ways of living that had a powerful impact on 19th century thinking. This lecture provides a background of utopian living through discussion of the Shaker community, Oneida, New Harmony, and Nashoba. It explores the specific transcendental communities of George Ripley's Brook Farm, Bronson Alcott's Fruitlands and Thoreau's Walden.

April 20 – *The Month That Was* Discussion Group facilitated by Dick Trice.

April 27 – *Transcendentalism and Education* facilitated by Tom Woods. The link between Transcendentalism and education was a close one. All of the major Transcendentalists spent years in the classroom as teachers and all found traditional education to be inadequate and stultifying. This lecture will cover Transcendentalist ideas about education that still impact education today.

Dedication Sunday - Reflections on a Day to Remember

Westside never looked better! Truer words were never spoken, but . . .

Westside's big day, the day we celebrated the dedication of our building and the ministry of Dr. Russell Elleven, is over. The planning, the work, the anticipation, the celebration, the music, the guests, the good wishes, the speeches, the flowers, the food, the fellowship – finished. We're glad that our Big Day is in the past because now . . .

We have memories to share, memories of sitting quietly while we were reminded of Westside's unique history – that who we are as a congregation and what Westside is today, began in 1994 with twenty-two members who had a dream and a vision.

We revisited in our minds the devastation of the fire that could have destroyed not just a building, but also the spirit of Westside. Instead, with the guidance of the man whose ministry we celebrated, that spirit learned to dance above the ashes. We watched with love and pride as Russell accepted a gift of a boxed set of sterling silver wedding cups.

We felt the excitement in a message from Dr. William Sinkford, president of UUA, as well as in congratulations and good wishes delivered by Mr. Ron Suiter, representing SWUUC, and Mr. Mike Ellsberry, representing NTAAUS. Mr Ellsberry delivered a check, part of our hoped-for 2008 grant from NTAAUS. We found humor, concern, and love in the words of the Reverend Mr. Paul John Roach, minister of Unity Church of Ft Worth; the Reverend Dr. David Barber, minister of First Congregational United Church of Christ; and Rabbi Ralph Meckenlenberger, who also supervised Tom Woods's installation of a Mezuzah on the front doorpost of the Sanctuary.

As the program progressed, the performance of our President, Brenda Baldwin, as mistress of ceremony, had everyone in the sanctuary spellbound and feeling very proud. We delighted in our children's Bell Choir presentation of This Little Light of Mine. We enjoyed musical selections by the TrUUeBelievers and were enthralled by the performance of Dace Sultanov, Cellist, and Matt Erickson, Pianist, as they played Massenet's "Meditation" from "Thais."

We won't soon forget the delicious cake and punch served in the narthex after the program, and our fellowship there with many friends and well-wishers who attended the program.

Yes, the Dedication is over. Westside now looks to the future. Our church continues to expand and offers to us, and to many not yet known to us, a shelter from life's storms, a place to grow in faith, knowledge, wisdom, and spirit. Westside's red doors open wide and say to all who enter, "Welcome home."

***Mezuzah-** The Mezuzah is a parchment inscribed with the Shema, which begins with the words, "Hear O Israel, the Lord is our God; the Lord is one . . ." The scroll is protected by a small, decorative case that can be made from wood, pewter, copper, tin, silver, etc., in combination or singly; some are decorated with crushed marble, crystals, turquoise, other gems, or unique romantic themes. The word Mezuzah means doorpost.*

Kennedy Fund is One Year Old

Our friend Gino Kennedy has been gone from our lives for one year. But the microbank group she had hoped to start is going strong, meeting at 7pm the second Thursday of each month at the church. The Kennedy Fund has distributed funds to 34 individuals or small groups in 17 countries around the globe. They include Afghanistan, Azerbaijan, Cambodia, Cameroon, Ecuador, Guatemala, Indonesia, Kenya, Lebanon, Mexico, Nicaragua, Nigeria, Pakistan, Samoa, Senegal and Tajikistan. We plan to fund nearly 3 dozen more projects this spring. Over half of the money has been repaid already, and five loans have been completely repaid.

We are working through KIVA.org, a microbank gateway founded by two twenty-somethings. Individuals all over the world make loans to individuals for as little as \$25. KIVA has been so successful that these loans are now being made at zero rates of interest. Kiva reports that just in the last week, over 3,000 new lenders have joined her. KIVA's field partners have funded 1800 new loans.

At our next meeting we plan to finish distributing about \$3,000 in our Kiva credit to additional entrepreneurs all over the globe. During our second year, we also hope to sponsor a workshop in this area to show other faith communities how their members can lend a hand to reduce poverty.

Potluck Picnic Sunday, April 20

This month's potluck, weather allowing, will be held in Daggett Park. If the weather is unsuitable for outdoor dining, we will have potluck as usual in the Fellowship Hall. Everyone's encouraged to bring a "picnic suitable" dish or two to share. "Picnic suitable" foods are foods that you can keep heated or cooled yourself before bringing them to the park AFTER church. Finger foods will be great, but so are those things that require a fork. We'll have disposable service pieces (plates, forks, napkins, etc.) available, but you are encouraged to "go green" by bringing your own reusable set-up for your own use. We will take serving tables to the park, but no chairs. Everyone is encouraged to bring their own chairs and some to share if you have them. Blankets for the ground are also appropriate, and we'll have some tarps for the ground in case there aren't enough chairs and blankets.

In addition to lunch and the usual good conversation, we'll have games (volleyball, relay races, etc.) for all ages. If you have an idea for an activity or would like to assist with activities, please contact Brenda Baldwin (brendabrew@hotmail.com or 817-988-9441).

The part of the park we plan to use, since it has the most shade and is convenient to the playground area, is the farthest corner from the church. If you are mobility-challenged, the shortest distance from parking to this area of the park is from street parking along Jessamine Street. However, there are stairs to navigate from that location. To get to Jessamine, go west on Page, take the first right after the park onto S. Adams St., and then take a right on Jessamine (don't be misled by the "one way" signs, they only apply when school is in session). Another parking option is the Daggett Elementary parking lot at College and Page, where there are no stairs, but it's a longer walk. Maps will be available at church. If you are physically able, please increase your enjoyment of the great outdoors and walk from the church to the park.

We are inviting our neighbors and friends who attend Green Fest on April 12 to return to Westside on April 20 to hear Dr. Elleven's

"Green" sermon and to join us for this picnic. Please show your support of Westside and welcome our guests by participating in, and inviting others to, this community event.

Passover Seder, First Time in our new home Saturday, April 19th, 6 pm

Charge: \$5.00 to pay for wine, matzo, printing of the Haggadahs and other costs associated with presenting the service.

Make your reservations to attend the first Passover Seder in our new congregation home followed by a potluck dinner. On this night we will join in celebrating as a family, the festival of Passover. Passover is an important part of our religious heritage which comes to us from our Jewish ancestors. Historically it began as a celebration of the liberation of the Hebrew people from slavery under the oppression of the Egyptians. Over the years this bold step toward freedom has become symbolic in the Judeo-Christian tradition of the need of peoples to move toward freedom. We will be using a Haggadah (the book containing the Seder service). Haggadahs date back to the eighth century.

Passover also has an important part in our Christian heritage. The Last Supper was a Passover Seder. During Passover, only unleavened food may be eaten. Therefore, matzo is substituted for leavened bread. Roast chicken, gefilte fish, matzo ball soup, fruits and vegetables are eaten. Look in the kosher section of your grocery store for Passover foods. Albertson's on Hulen and Central Market have good kosher sections for Passover. Look in cookbooks for Passover recipes. We ask that you not bring ham or shell fish as these are forbidden in Jewish diets.

The service lasts about 30 to 45 minutes. Children are invited to participate. If requested at least one week in advance, we will have a child care provider for infants. Your Board of Directors will review the recipient's qualifications with two simple criteria: 1) "Do donations to the recipient further our church's vision and mission?" and 2) "Are the recipient's values in sympathy with the seven Unitarian Universalist principles?" Service project donation recipients may be repeated throughout the year based on need and number of participating recipients. All qualified recipients not chosen one month will continue to be reviewed in the following months. More about the UUSC-UUA Kenya Crisis Fund

The Board will donate the April plate offering to the Unitarian-Universalist Service Committee's Kenya Crisis Fund, which was set up in January to assist victims of rioting in Kenya following their election late last year. The recommendation came as a result of contributions made by our Kennedy Fund to a Kenyan woman, who is having trouble repaying her loan on time. When members reviewed the situation in Kenya, they found that over half of loan recipients were behind in repayments because of the civil unrest.

This led to interest in work the UU Service Committee has been doing to help those in need. "It's important for UUs to understand the situation," UUA Trustee Rosemary McNatt said. "We're watching the Kenyan people struggle to create a democratic process, a process we ourselves affirm in our Fifth Principle" ["The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large"].

This was an opportunity for Westside to join hands with the UUA. Hopefully, both organizations, and those in need around the world, will benefit. *-Ann Sutherland*

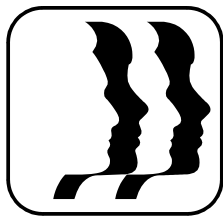
Youth Happenings

Opportunities

YOU CAN HELP - SCAC (South Central Alliance of Churches), of which Westside is a member, is collecting items to assemble emergency toiletry kits for their clients. SCAC has found that distributing sample-size products to their clients isn't sufficient to get families through the crisis that created the need. Therefore, they will be assembling kits of full size toiletries for families, and Westside will be providing the deodorant.
