## Green Fest, A Joyful Day

Westside UU celebrated Earth Day early with its first Green Fest on Saturday, April 12. With tents and canopies in the west parking lot, garden area, and back alley, volunteers and vendors transformed our "campus" into a carnival setting from 11 to 5.

Music by our own troubadours, speeches and demonstrations by local activists and professionals (including Westside members), a lovely environmental film based on Thoreau's "Walking," a joyful spontaneous drumming circle, and an array of activities

for children enlivened 901 Page Avenue as dozens of volunteers generated an Earth-loving day-long party for members and visitors.

Green Fest was designed to celebrate and illustrate the Unitarian Universalist principle of respect for the interdependent web of all existence, as well as those spiritual traditions that celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct people to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.

In addition to successfully promoting our UU principles, we raised \$2000 towards the \$3800 remaining from the Board's annual pledge by selling food and beverages, raffle tickets for donated eco-friendly basket items, bake walk "chances" on goods made by church members, time in the "bounce house," and vendor spaces. We also earned money through donations of gifts ranging from green tea to live trees as well as for face painting and crafts in the kids' area.

Russell Feed and Supply (Sandy Olah's company) is donating profit from sales that day at their booth, and Green Mountain Energy has pledged to give us \$50 for each person who signed with them during the day at their booth.

One unanticipated outcome of the fest and it might be the most important of all - is that the folks who participated felt we became stronger as a community. We created new friendships, strengthened relationships, brought new people into the congregation, challenged each other to be supportive and proactive in stressful circumstances, and just plain had fun with people we tend to merely see across the room on Sundays.

The event's co-producers, Linda Jenkins and Diane Jones, will assemble a "note-book" of information that can serve the congregation for future festive events that we open to the public as well as for internal communications and planning.

A huge thank you goes to all volunteers who did incredible work to make Green Fest a joyous celebration.

## Go Green All the Way

The publication of Jessica Mitford's *American Way of Death* in 1963 exposed the excesses of the funeral industry and inspired the formation of groups interested in reducing the inflated costs of dying.

The Funeral Consumers of North Texas now has a membership of nearly five thousand. Like most such groups, the society has agreements with undertakers in the community who will provide inexpensive services at predetermined costs. Prepaid services are not recommended. When you join, you will receive a prearrangement form that allows you to designate your preference for the disposition of your body—burial, cremation or donation. Having this settled in advance allows peace of mind for survivors during a difficult time.

The society monitors state and federal legislation, advocates for consumer protection in funeral practices and keeps members up-to-date on problems. The lifetime membership fee is \$35 for families or \$25 for individuals. If you move to another state, membership is transferable.

## UUs Working on Green Commitment to the Earth

UU Ministry for Earth has announced that the Green Sanctuary Program will become an official program managed by the UU Association of Congregations. This will be the first UUA program devoted exclusively to Earth concerns.

The UU Ministry for Earth (formerly the Seventh Principle Project) is an affiliate organization of the Unitarian Universalist Association. It has sponsored the congregation based Green Sanctuary Program. A Green Sanctuary is a congregation that lives out its commitment to the Earth by creating a sustainable life style for its members as individuals and as a faith community.

Since 2002, 59 Unitarian Universalist congregations have been accredited as Green Sanctuaries in recognition of their achievements in ecology-based worship and religious education, environmental justice, and sustainable living.

## Russell Wins Another Grant

Last year the American Humanist Association announced that three grants of \$1000 each would be awarded to the humanist chapters in the U.S. that were planning the most creative and productive programs for the new year. As a

member and first chair of the Humanists of Fort Worth, Dr. Russell Elleven proposed that our chapter establish a SMART program for the North Texas area. SMART is Self Management and Recovery Training, a program to support persons recovering from addictive behaviors of many kinds without relying on a 'higher power' or other 12-step concepts. SMART is recognized by the American Academy of Physicians, the Center for Health Care Evaluation, the National Institute on Drug Abuse, the U.S. Dept of HHS, and the American Society of Addictive Medicine. Russell is of course more than qualified for this work.

As a result, HOFW won one of the grants and the money has been used to make his new undertaking known to professionals connected to potential clients and to purchase needed handbooks, postage, fliers, and other materials. As most of you know, Russell began this program in January, meeting with clients one evening each week in our church. Appreciative participants are coming to these meetings from far away as Weatherford and north Dallas.

The AHA announced new grants would be awarded again this year for outstanding chapters and, would you believe it, Russell's proposal for enhancing the SMART program won another grant! In addition to the valuable mental health service he is providing, the public profile, reputation, and ultimate membership of WSUUC will grow as well. Russell's vitality and prolific contributions to the wellbeing of our church and the delight of our members never cease to amaze.

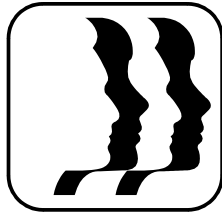
community with a ceremony officiated by Russell. The ceremony will take place immediately following Sunday service. Come, witness, and be part of this very special event!

Josh has a colorful and convoluted family background, culminating with his leaving his home with his Mother and coming to live with his dad. As Josh puts it, "I changed parents." He left his Mom's house on Christmas Day, and came to live with his dad, who has received him enthusiastically. Josh has been estranged from his Mom for several years.

After graduating from Paschal High School in 2005, Josh spent over two years studying math and computer science at TCU. He didn't like all the "filler" classes which he was required to take, and left TCU in his junior year. He says he "may or may not" go back.

Presently, Josh is working for Game-Stop, where he has been for about seven months. He likes his job, where he is a shift manager. He enjoys the industry and the company. He particularly likes to be involved in internal audits and loss prevention.
