DO YOU CLICK?

Audrey Weil clicks. Nathan Day clicks. Beverly Archibald clicks. What is this clicking all about?

It's free, takes less than two minutes per day, and supports some wonderful causes. The advertising sponsors pay for the site, and your click is incredibly beneficial to the charity each site supports. What are those charities?

Hunger – to date, over 300 million people have clicked to donate more than 657 million cups of staple food to feed the hungry around the world.

Breast Cancer – provides free mammograms through the National Breast Cancer foundation. Early detection can save lives. Your daily click pays for part of a mammogram.

Child Health – offers simple and very effective health care treatment for children around the world. Has helped more than 2,161,000 children receive treatment, all from clicks, providing everything from HIV testing, vitamin supplements, various surgeries, and the manufacture and fitting of children's prostheses – all FREE!

Literacy - On average, over 80,000 individuals from around the world visit the site each day. To date, more than 87 million visitors have helped provide more than 1.6 million books to children who need them the most.

Rain Forest - On average, over 35,500 individuals from around the world vis-

it the site each day to click the green "Click Here to Give - it's FREE" button. To date, more than 150 million visitors have preserved more than 40,500 acres of rain forest land.

Animal Rescue - focuses the power of the Internet on a specific need — providing food for some of the 27 million unwanted animals given to shelters in the U.S. every year. Over 10 million animals are put to death every year in the U.S. alone because they are abandoned and unwanted. Animal Rescue Site provides food and care for a rescued animal living in a shelter or sanctuary. Funding for food and care is paid by site sponsors and distributed to animals in need at the Fund for Animals' renowned animal sanctuaries (including Cleveland Amory Black Beauty Ranch in Texas and the Wildlife Rehabilitation Center in California).

So – how do you click? The sites are www.thebreastcancersite (or whichever site you choose to support). For each site, a large colored button saying "Click Here to Give – it's FREE" appears; simply click the button and your gift is registered. There is a list on the left side of each site under "Free ways you can help". One of the items is "Daily Click Reminder" I use this so that I will not forget to click every single day. You only need one reminder, as once you enter the site; all six of the charities are listed across the top of the page. Each site has detailed information about where the money goes, how many people visit the site daily, and other pertinent information. It is FREE to click. It takes only a minute or two

For the month of July 2009, the board is pleased to announce that the undesignated plate offering is going to assist the Allied Communities of Tarrant (ACT). ACT is a grass roots community level organization recently instrumental in informing the public about JPS Hospital's positions on health care for undocumented aliens and influencing positive changes in their policies. ACT continues its work to improve health care for Tarrant County's residents by publicizing the recent expansion of access at its member churches. Other goals include improvement of Fort Worth schools, focusing on attendance, graduation rates and more. ACT works within under-represented constituencies to train leaders, facilitate organization, and strengthen their ability to address issues that affect them. Westside and SCAC Ask for Clinic

On Friday, June 11th, the South Central Alliance of Churches, of which we are a member, submitted a request to JPS Healthnet for a school-based clinic to be housed at the Southside Church of Christ campus, 1101 Hemp-hill. The clinic would provide immunizations, preventive care, care for sick children and other medical services to children enrolled in the Fort Worth ISD and their siblings. Children without insurance would pay \$5 (though no child is turned away).

We hope for approval in the 2009-10 budget in a few months. The bulk of work will be done by the Southside Church, supplemented by voluntary contributions from individuals and churches. If approved, the Social Justice Committee will request a plate offering be donated for this purpose.

The clinic will bring about \$250,000 in medical services to needy children

in our area. Aside from the Galvan Clinic, JPS school-based clinics are the only reliable source of low-cost medical care for undocumented children in Tarrant County.

Community Garden in Fairmount

Some of us are interested in a community garden. Serena Keeler of the Fairmount Southside Neighborhood Association reports that the Fairmount Neighborhood, Fort Worth South and TCU are currently working together with the city of Fort Worth's Parks Department to create a long term lease agreement for the use of 1504 5th Avenue.

Fairmount would like to turn this vacant lot into a community garden with 10% of its harvest going to the Food Bank. We hope to create a place that brings people together. We also hope to create a lease agreement that is easy for other neighborhoods to follow if they desire a place to grow their own food. In the meantime, there is a makeshift garden at 1712 6th Avenue.
