The Kennedy Fund is managed by a group of Westside members and currently helps support about fifty individuals or groups throughout the third world. The funds donated by us are returned and can be re-lent to other deserving individuals.

Ann’s husband, David Burlingame, and she met while working with Allied Communities of Tarrant in their effort to extend charity health care to Tarrant County’s 100,000 undocumented residents. David is employed at the V.A. Hospital in Dallas, and he and Ann continue their efforts on behalf of the medically indigent.

*Delegate Report from
General Assembly*

The vote wasn't even close: 2062 to 1481. The Rev. Peter Morales won 61 percent of the on-site vote, and 55 percent of the absentee votes to become the eighth president of the UUA.

Campaigners in blue for Hallman or gold for Morales flooded the halls of the Salt Palace, home of the 2009 GA, handing out buttons and flyers, sprigs of mountain laurel (get it?), bandanas and "Peter for President" temporary tattoos. Participants packed the Thursday night candidate forum. Newsletters from each candidate appeared morning and evening, chockfull of endorse-

ments for the candidates. Those entering the exhibits hall somehow had to pass the candidates' double-sized booths, milling campaigners and more flyers.

Oddly, no one had any idea of how the election was progressing. We had no polls to guide us, no TV pundits, nothing but anecdotes, hearsay and optimistic speculation, all of which we had in abundance.

By Saturday afternoon when voting began, non-campaigning participants were trudging to their next workshop, avoiding eye contact or waving off campaigners with a "I've already decided" gesture. And in the end, the election wasn't even close. The Rev. Laurel Hallman conceded gracefully, and the UUA moves on under a new president.

Other outcomes were squeaky close. By narrowly reaching the two-thirds requirement, the Peacemaking Statement of Conscience (SOC) was returned to the Commission on Social Witness for additional study. You can read the draft proposal here: <http://www.uua.org/socialjustice/issuesprocess/currentissues/peacemaking/121606.shtml>.)

But the vote to change Article II was close – so close in fact that the counters had to try twice, and in the end the changes were rejected by a margin of 13 votes. This hotly debated proposal tampered with the Principles and Purposes section of the UUA bylaws, found in the front pages of our hymnal.

Six Actions of Immediate Witness (AIW) were submitted, and all six were accepted. These AIWs, as the name states, cover issues that can't wait for the two-year discernment time of a Statement of Conscience:

1: Advocate Pending Legislation Toward Clean, Honest, and Fair Elections in the United States.

2: Support U.S. Ratification of the Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty.

3: Support America's Red Rock Wilderness Act.

4: Support Bolivian UUs Struggling for Justice and Human Rights.

5: Call for a Commission of Inquiry of U.S.-Sponsored Torture.

6: Oppose Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity-Based Violence in Iraq.

Susan's story

I donated the old metal library cart used for the hymnals back when Westside UU purchased the Paige street building. At that time, there was more than enough room on the one cart for all of the hymnals. I have been aware that it was not longer

adequate for some time, but was not inspired until Russell announced his desire to be ordained by Westside in UU ministry. I decided then to build two new hymnal carts in honor of Russell's Ordination.

Since I am still a "baby" woodworker, I sought the help of my mentor, teacher and brother, JEB Johnson, MD, of San Antonio. The carts were built in his workshop and he gets all the credit for the design of the bentwood handles. On my own, the carts would have been only practical and nice pieces of furniture because the bentwood design was way beyond my skill level. I, on the other hand, have the patience for repeatedly sanding and putting more coats of poly on. So I will take the credit for the finish.

These carts are my way of honoring Russell's decision to become ordained as a Unitarian Universalist minister.

Social Justice Committee News

The Social Justice Committee met July 23rd to finish applying for KIVA grants and review activities relating to the Rainbow Lounge incident. Some of us also attended the Dallas Peace Center lecture in July featuring retired CIA agent Ray McGovern.

And on July 31st we worked with RE teen-agers to provide dinner to Samaritan House residents. It was a big success! Thank you, RE teens, for your enthusiasm.

Our Kennedy Fund has now made over 100 loans totaling over \$15,000. In June we made our first loan in the United States, to Maria. Maria borrowed \$7,000 from lenders like us to purchase a software

program which will enable her to expand her business. She does billing to insurance companies for doctors. This loan was reviewed and packaged through Kiva, now working with field partner Accion.

At our July meeting we loaned out another \$600. We are also interested in joining with other Fort Worth area organizations to bring forth a lending presence here for people like Maria, who want to build businesses but who have little experience with small loans.

We will meet again in September.

NATUURES Teacher Training

The North Texas Area UU Religious Educators are sponsoring a teacher training for all the area churches' teachers on Saturday, August 15.
