Thanksgiving Baskets for our Neighbors

This year, Westside UU Church will again be participating through South Central Alliance of Churches (SCAC) in providing Thanksgiving dinners to needy people in our neighborhood. SCAC will purchase the turkeys, for which the clients will pay \$5.00 if they are able to do so. In 2008, SCAC provided food to 405 families at Thanksgiving. Families ranged in size from one person — usually elderly — to 10 or 12 — with children!

In 2008, Westside provided 30 bags. This year, we have committed to fill 42 grocery bags. Last year, Brenda Baldwin provided reusable “green” bags for the grocery. Do we have a volunteer who would like to provide the bags this year? Each bag will contain the following items:

- 1 15-16 oz can cranberry sauce
- 1 15-16 oz can chicken broth
- 1 15 oz can corn
- 1 14 oz bag stuffing mix (or 2 4 oz boxes) Pepperidge Farm, StoveTop or equivalent
- 1 15 oz can green beans
- 1 15 oz can yams
- 1 small box tea bags or drink mix
- 1 15 oz can fruit
- 1 box cake mix (for 13” x 9” cake)
- 1 3 or 6 oz pkg jello
- 1 pkg icing for cake (ready to use)

There will be a display on a table in the narthex starting on October 25 from which you will be able to choose the items you would like to provide. These items are due at church by Sunday, November 15. We will also need a small group of volunteers to fill the bags on November 22. Jay and Suzie Lotven have agreed to take the bags to SCAC on November 23.

SCAC has stressed that it is very important that we stick to the sizes requested. Larger families will be given two bags. Also, SCAC is only allowed to give out food in its original packaging. For example, you may not buy a larger box of tea bags and repackage them into smaller units.

So – please, buy only the sizes requested. And be sure your grocery items are not past the “sell by” or “use by” date, as SCAC is not allowed to give out outdated items. Also, please do not leave plastic or paper bags at the church when you bring your items.

Volunteers are needed to interview people to determine who is eligible and who is not for the Thanksgiving baskets – every Tuesday in October and the first Tuesday in November. It will be from 10 am to noon. There is an interview form and I am told it is not hard to do.

Volunteers will be needed at SCAC again on Tuesday, November 24 between 1 and 5 pm to hand out the turkeys and bags to the families. If you want to would like to volunteer, or have

Westside forms new social action committee

At Westside we can take our UU values into the community through social action. We are already participating in the service aspect of this endeavor. Now we are forming a new committee which will address the other four ways of providing social action. Please join the Social Witness Committee.

Five Types of Social Action

1. SERVICE: The purpose of social service is to meet the needs of persons in distress. This is being done by our Social Justice Committee.

2. EDUCATION: The purpose of social education is to inform people about the aspects of the issues and also interpret the issue within the context of liberal religious values by workshops, public meetings, sermons, etc.

3. WITNESS: The purpose of social witness is to make public our UU convictions regarding a particular issue, such as participating in demonstrations, vigils and marches, writing letters to newspapers, etc.

4. ADVOCACY: The purpose of advocacy is to work through the legislative process to impact on public policy by writing letters, visiting elected officials, etc.

5. COMMUNITY ORGANIZING: The purpose of community organizing is to gain strength and power through groups to influence decisions that will change situations. Methods include developing a strong organization, influencing policy and decision-makers, and empowering people so they can achieve self-determination.

Southwest regional director of the Industrial Areas Foundation (IAF), the largest and oldest institution for community organizing in the United States (Dahle, 2007). His inspirational discussions of community organizing techniques focus upon core values of his constituents, not just on the hot button issues of the day. Under Cortes' direction, IAF has accomplished over \$1 billion worth of neighborhood improvements in the impoverished areas of San Antonio, TX as well as in border communities along the Rio Grande valley.

Quoting Cortes, "We used to ask whether people were fit for democracy," he explains. "Now we realize that people become fit through democracy. There is an aspect of our humanity that only emerges when we engage those around us in a debate about our own interests. Our organizations have become mini universities for participating in public life." Cortes brings to the Dallas/Fort Worth area this sharp and energetic focus on how we can improve our public schools.

Joe says that he can usually send energy in his thoughts to someone and wait for them to call him. He "tends to live a few minutes in the future". He says, "Many people are sure they know me from someone, but cannot recall the circumstances."

Our youth lead the service, the classes are shortened so we can spend time playing group games, such as; tug-o-war, sack races and croquet. It is great fun!

Westside Camping Trip

This year the camping trip is Oct. 16-18. We are having regularly scheduled RE classes on the 18th. See you there!

This year I want to start something different to give parents an idea of what their children are learning in class. Each group of teachers will be giving us a synopsis of the next month's lessons. This way the parents can ask questions about specific lessons and what the children learned. We will call this portion;

What's up in your World Curriculum?

Beatrix Potter (Nursery) - There is no set curriculum for the nursery. Our stuffed animals will be wearing different religious symbols, like they did last year. We will also be incorporating world music and stories from other religions as well. Cindy has also made a hide-and-seek board of religious symbols.

Clara Barton (3-6 yr olds)- The curriculum is "We are Many, We are One." The Barton class will be celebrating the Moon Festival (South East Asian Mid-Autumn Festival) and Halloween on the first and fourth Sundays of October. On the second Sunday our class will have the first of a series of lessons involving trees and nature. For this lesson we will choose a special "class tree" that we will observe and photograph throughout the year. On the third Sunday all of the Barton teachers will be at the church camping trip and the classes will be combined for a fun activity.

Susan B. Anthony (7-9 yr. olds)- The curriculum is "Holidays and Holy Days." October kicks off with what has become a student (and teacher!) favorite, St. Francis Day. The children will learn about the famous saint who preached to the animals.

The following week, we'll take on Africa, where masks represent the many traditional beliefs about God.

On the weekend of October 18, many of the students and teachers will be away at the church camping trip, possibly leaving us with smaller classes. For this week, the Anthony class will combine with the Barton class to celebrate United Nations Day. We'll round out the month by welcoming the Goddess Lakshmi, with our session on Divali, a holiday that spans numerous religions.
