



Green Sanctuary Committee Organizes

The Green Sanctuary Committee held an enthusiastic organizational meeting Thursday, October 8th. Members came with a number of ideas and the willingness to really pitch in and start the Green Sanctuary process rolling. By our next meeting, November 19th, we plan to have approved our vision statement, conducted a professional energy audit of the church building, and prepared a draft questionnaire for our church community. This will begin the process of applying for Green Sanctuary candidacy. Then, with the help of our congregation, and with input from UUA and the many other congregations on this journey, we will select twelve program activities in four areas: worship, religious education, sustainable living, and environmental justice. Once UUA has evaluated our selected activities and approved Westside's candidacy, we will begin a fun year of bringing them to fruition. The accreditation process, much like that

for becoming a Welcoming Congregation, will involve every facet of our church community. We envision a greener church, more environmentally friendly practices by church members and friends, and a more environmentally aware community. What we will not be is an environmental police force, badgering our congregation, nor will we be suggesting church upgrades that are economically infeasible.

Westside UU has already made notable strides in sustainability by greatly reducing the use of disposable paper products at snack times, potlucks, and on camping trips. Courses covering Voluntary Simplicity and Sustainability have brought new understanding to many of our members, and last year saw a very successful Green Fest. Our new, and very popular, Ethical Eating Group is also a part of becoming more environmentally aware and modifying old habits.

Got Feedback?

The Committee on Ministry (COM) is charged with the responsibility for oversight of the health and well-being of the ministries within the congregation. To that end, the committee meets monthly with Russell to discuss issues which have arisen. The committee will hear, in confidence, any concerns in this regard which are raised by any congregant, and will seek to address them promptly and thoroughly. Similarly, the committee assists and supports the minister in his role. Feedback is welcome, not just concerns, but compliments as well. The committee, in addition, informs itself on matters of ministerial compensation and makes a recommendation to the Board as appropriate. A lesser-known function of the COM is to serve in an ombudsman capacity when conflicts arise between members of the congregation, and the presence of a neutral third party may be of assistance. The congregation may expect both confidentiality and sensitivity in these matters.

The members of the committee are selected jointly by the board and the minister for two year terms. Please feel free to contact any member of the COM: Dick Trice (Chair), Mary Alice Cretsinger, Kay Kubala, Lin Wells and Tom Woods.

Christmas Angels

Again this year Westside will be participating in South Central Alliance of Churches' (SCAC) Angel Tree, to provide gifts of toys and clothing to needy children in zip codes 76104, 76110 and 76109. Last year we had thirty angels; this year, we will have forty.

Angels will be available for you to select on Sundays at church, starting November 15. The Angels (green for boys and red for girls) will have information about each child's name, clothing sizes and "toy wishes".

You are asked to purchase one outfit for your child, as well as a toy for him or her as well as an age appropriate book. If the toy needs batteries, please include them as well. When you take an angel from the tree, we will record the child's name and number (on the angel) as well as your name and telephone number.

SCAC asks that each child's gifts be unwrapped in a separate bag with a handle, with the angel attached to the bag (like a gift tag).

Please bring all gift bags to church on December 6. Suzie and Jay Lotven have volunteered to take the gifts to SCAC, as well as to help distribute them. If you are interested in helping with this joyous event, please let us know.
