Sunday Services

August 7: *"All Will Be Well, Indeed"* by Linda Ice, Cindy Fountain, Dianne Nixon, and James Finn. You have no doubt felt it - this is an exciting time to be at Westside Unitarian Universalist Church! These presenters have had the privilege of serving this congregation as president through this period of transition and interim ministry. They will reflect on the nearly 3-year journey that got us to this exciting place and share hopes and dreams for Westside's bright future.

August 14: *"Eight Magic Words that Bring Joy"* by Stan Yoder. We're UUs. We seriously worry about the myriad ills in our world. When things don't improve fast enough, we sometimes feel despair. Adult Religious Education Class

11:30-12:30 in the "Glass Classroom"

Throughout August, we will continue viewing and discussing a series of DVD lectures from the Great Courses entitled "Religions of the Axial Age: An Approach to the World's Religions." Professor Muesse, who delivers the lectures, will offer striking insights as he draws you closer to the period between 800 to 200 B.C.E., an era with notable parallels to our own. Together we will explore fascinating aspects of several major world religions at the time of their birth. What could the beliefs and traditions of a Zoroastrian, a person of Jewish faith, a Buddhist, a follower of Confucius, or a Christian have in common? How do religions evolve over time? Throughout these lessons we will reflect on the central question of the course: What does the study of the Axial Age teach us about religion as a phenomenon in our lives? Upcoming Children's Religious Education Events

Sophia Fah's Pre-K Class

For children under 5, childcare is available in the combined Barton Nursery and Fah's Pre-K Class. This class will be led this summer by our Childcare Coordinator Karen Vera and our other childcare staffer, Karla Hurtado, along with various volunteers. For the older kids, we will be using summer oriented activities such as summer safety, water and ice play, and nature trips as learning opportunities.

1st Service -- Children's Chapel: The Children's Chapel class will continue to meet as usual during the first service with lots of guest facilitators to lead alternative, interactive, worship times for kids.

2nd Service -- Build a Village: Exploring Neighbors and Economic Justice (Incoming K-3rd)

This class will meet in what is normally the Anthony Classroom (by the parking lot exit in the fellowship hall). Build a Village is story based and is set up in the style of Montessori and Spirit Play. Each tale is accompanied with questions intended as a springboard to explore economic justice. Following each story, there is opportunity to participate in a game or create artwork.

Sing to the Power (Incoming 4th-8th) This summer, we will be combining the Anthony Class with the Young Class. The group will meet in the Young Classroom (room in the fellowship hall closest to the sanctuary). Sing to the Power is a UUA Tapestry of Faith curriculum which affirms our Unitarian Universalist heritage of confronting "powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love." Participants experience their own power, and understand how it can help them to be leaders.

Emerson Class (Incoming 9th-12th) This summer's high school class will consist primarily of youth lead discussions of topics of their choosing with adult facilitators present. The class will also bring in several guest speakers over the course of the summer to discuss everything from Women's Issues to Mental Health Awareness.

Fellowship Days!! Fellowship Days are alternatives to Sunday School where groups combine for various activities and workshops during the second service.

August 14: Teen-Lead Workshop Day. Teen youth will have the opportunity to engage with the younger children and lead their own workshops in everything from bead making to Rubix Cubes.

August 28: Story Day. Guest Storytellers will pay a visit to Westside for a special presentation during CRE Classes.

Signals

As I write this from Indiana, two days before leaving for Texas and Westside, communication methods are much on my mind. People have a proliferation of tools – like this e-newsletter – to help us connect with each other. We use them in a wide variety of ways and they are always evolving. During my recent seminary training, I used video calls, private Facebook groups and collaborative Google docs to connect with people and enhance learning. I continue to use such tools professionally and am delighted that Westside makes use of a variety of technologies to support its mission. Currently, I'm bracing myself for several days without internet access while my family is on the road. Likewise, I'm mentally preparing to adjust to a new smart phone soon. I'm still using my first one, which pre-dates my six-year-old, and it has become increasingly slow and less reliable. I recently updated my web site to reflect my relationship to Westside (www.shariwoodbury.com) and I created a new email address for use in my ministry role: revshariw@gmail.com. When I get to Fort Worth, I plan to get a local cell number, too, to use for pastoral care and other church business. Can you hear me now?

Of course, communication is a two-way street. I look forward to hearing from Westside's members and friends and getting to know you. Please stay tuned for structured opportunities to connect with me in person, individually or in small groups, in coming weeks and months.

During this first month, like most new settled ministers, I'll be setting myself up in the church and community, beginning to connect with key groups in the congregation, and starting to plan for the church year. I've decided not to have quite as "soft" a start as some of my counterparts, since Westside is a year-round church, and has been waiting longer than usual for a new settled minister. But we will begin at a measured pace and take the time to get to know each other. The first few Sundays, I will attend and experience the service firsthand, getting a sense of what it's like for a member or visitor to come to Westside for worship. I will be in the pulpit the last two Sundays of August.

A few weeks ago I saw some of my favorite signals. It was dusk, and in the cooling Indiana evening, fireflies twinkled under the outstretching arms of a great tree. As I walked toward home, a firefly flew right before me, and I spontaneously reached out to catch it. Aha! I marveled at having this glowing being within my fist. But I quickly opened my hand, not wanting the creature to feel trapped. It stayed with me, riding along on my thumb as I walked, for about five minutes, while I studied its blinking form. Later I looked up the meaning of this creature as a totem animal, just for fun. Of the many meanings suggested, at this time of beginning to connect with Westside, this one especially rings true for me: "Fireflies remind us that there are others who will respond to us.... They flash with similar creative rhythms." I certainly sense that there is great creative energy at Westside. Even before I have arrived on Texas soil, I witness partners stepping forward to help create new and meaningful worship experiences; to engage more deeply in "being UUs out loud" in the world; and to enhance the diverse, intergenerational community of Westside. What a delight to see these signals!

Whether you communicate by blinking lights, phone or Facebook, I look forward to connecting further with you. If you made it all the way to the end of this newsletter column, you can help me with church communications by dropping me an email at revshariw@gmail.com to let me know that you did so. I may not respond to these messages, but the number I get will tell me something about how many people are reading the printed word at Westside these days.

The water can also represent an experience or awareness that aligns with the energy of each of the directions. Pastoral Care Team

Your Pastoral Care Team, originally called The Chaplain Corps, was started by Dr. Russell Elleven in 2009. This is the group who help the minister in serving the needs of the congregation. This includes, but is not limited to, visiting the sick and homebound, arranging for help with meals where needed, calling and checking on the health of members who have been ill, have had surgery, or are otherwise needing help, and generally keeping up with the health and welfare of the congregation. We provide a listening ear for Westsiders.

In order to do this, we need your help! We cannot serve you if we don't know what is going on in your

life. Please, let us know when you have health or other concerns. Or if you know of a fellow member who might like to have a visit or benefit from our services. We can sometimes put you in touch with community services of which you might not be aware. And we are good listeners!

Strict confidentiality is maintained at all times. You do not need to worry about anything you tell your Pastoral Care Team. We, as does the minister, keep all of the information you give us in strictest confidence, unless you give us permission to share with the congregation. Sometimes, sharing with the congregation will help you to get support from your fellow Westsiders and you may wish for us to do this. There is a saying that "If you share a joy, it becomes two joys. If you share a sorrow, it becomes half a sorrow". But please know that your information is only shared with your permission.

The original team, chaired by Caroline Nixon, was Beverly Archibald, Jane Hansen, Diane Jones, Paul McGinnis and Myrtle McMahan. Myrtle and Beverly are still with the team, having been joined by Andrea Petty, Coordinator, and David Burlingame, Linda McDonnell, Aija Jenssen and Sandy Lord.

Summary of the June 15 Board Meeting

Consent Agenda (reports and minutes in the minutes book)

Financial Statements and Report - (full report in the minutes book) The new Board will be asked to help find a depository for our reserve funds which is more cost effective.

Roof Repair - Dianne has signed a contract with Dennehy Architects for documents and other services to assist with the repairs. The total cost is not to exceed \$10,625 but Dennehy has been advised that we budgeted a maximum of \$10,000.

Repainting Request for AMS - The Board voted to authorize paying up to \$1,000 to repaint two classrooms preserving the murals, with AMS paying for half.

Structural Information - We have learned from a member of Unity Church that the Fellowship Hall was not built to sustain a second story. Unity Church considered adding a second story, but decided against it when a study showed that the ground under the building is very soft, and that one would have to drive piles thirty feet down to bedrock to provide adequate support for a second story.

Sanders Gift - The Board expressed a preference for placing the money in an accessible, interest bearing fund such as our Endowment Fund. A final decision will be postponed until the new minister arrives.

Membership Committee Requests - The Board voted that the President would publish a draft Agenda of upcoming Board meetings to all members by the Monday preceding the meeting. The request from the Committee to include a current profession/job in the Directory on a voluntary basis was denied. As an alternative, members might be allowed to post small ads on a bulletin board, and the Digital Committee is working to include access to this information as part of their upgrade of the email Forum.

Building Request for Ladder - The Board voted to purchase a folding ladder for \$249.

Safe Congregation, CPR/AED Training - The Board agreed that training should be conducted only by a certified trainer.

Scheduling "12 Years a Slave" Movie - Cameron will work with Adult RE to find an appropriate current movie on the issue of racism and schedule a showing.

The next meeting will be August 17 at 7:00 p.m. All members are welcome to attend. Notebooks containing copies of the full minutes, reports, and financial statements are available in the church office.

Seventh Principle Notes from your Green Sanctuary Committee

Food, Monsanto, and Genetically Modified Organisms (GMOs): On July 10, our Sunday Forum discussed food that has been genetically modified to achieve certain effects, mostly to do with making crops resistant to select pesticides and herbicides. Perhaps the best known bio-agricultural company is Monsanto, with its highly popular Roundup (glyphosate) herbicide. Our discussion elicited the usual questions about the benefits and dangers of GMOs. We also talked about why the biotech and food industries have been willing to spend hundreds of millions of dollars on lobbying and donations to legislators to defeat GMO labeling at state and federal levels. We mentioned that many farmers in India have committed suicide (I have since learned that the number was 17,638 in 2009, alone) because they have become trapped in the ultra-expensive Monsanto GMO web and cannot provide for their families. We talked about the testing of these products and how they are approved: Individuals who helped develop some of these products at Monsanto then resigned and immediately went to work for the FDA in a position where they helped approve them for public release. One of the most noteworthy was rBGH, or recombinant Bovine Growth Hormone for dairy cattle, which causes problems in animals, people, and beyond. And we also touched on the dangers of monoculture and industry control of agriculture. Space here is limited, but I'd suggest you look at www.foodandwaterwatch.org for a lot more information. There is a short bit, "Five Things Monsanto Doesn't Want You to Know About GMOs," and a 28-page detailed profile of the company. We considered showing one of two movies on Monsanto, Percy Schmeiser: David versus Monsanto, or The World According to Monsanto for our Green Movie this month, but both are readily available on you tube for your viewing pleasure. So I think we will go with a different film, instead.
